NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (6-1) at CLEVELAND BROWNS (2-5)

Sun., Nov. 7, 2010 ★ Cleveland Browns Stadium (73,300) ★ 1:00 p.m. EDT

The New England Patriots won their fifth straight game to improve to an NFL-best 6-1 record and claim first place in the AFC East following a 28-18 victory last Sunday against Minnesota.

The Patriots travel to play the Browns in Cleveland on Sunday in the first game of the only back-to-back road trip for the Patriots in 2010. The team will follow this week's game at Cleveland with a Sunday Night Football game at Pittsburgh on Nov. 14. Under head coach Bill Belichick the Patriots are 26-14 when going on the road for two straight games or more.

The Patriots posted a 4-0 record in October and enter November with an NFL-best 75-22 (.773) record after Nov. 1 since 2001. Indianapolis has the second-best record after Nov. 1 since 2001 with a 66-32 record.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast to a regional audience by CBS and can be seen in Boston on **WBZ-TV Channel 4**. **Bill Macatee** will handle play-by-play duties with **Rich Gannon** providing color. The game will be produced by **Bob Dekas** and directed by **Andy Goldberg**.

RADIO: 98.5 FM, The Sports Hub, is the flagship station for the **Patriots Radio Network**. A complete listing of the network's 36 stations can be found in this press release. Play-by-play broadcaster **Gil Santos** is in his 34th season as the voice of the Patriots and will call the action along with Patriots Hall of Famer **Gino Cappelletti**. Santos and Cappelletti are celebrating their 27th season as a tandem.

STRONG IN THE SECOND HALF

Since 2001, New England has done a remarkable job of finishing the season strong, compiling a 75-22 (.773) record after Nov. 1, including playoff games.

PATRIOTS vs. AFC NORTH

The Patriots are 14-2 all-time against the AFC North in the regular-season since it was founded in 2002. The only AFC North losses for New England were to the Steelers, with a 34-20 loss at Pittsburgh (10/31/04) and a 33-10 loss vs. Pittsburgh (11/30/08). The Patriots only other loss to the AFC North during that time frame was a 33-14 loss in a 2009 Wild Card game at home against Baltimore. The Patriots are 2-0 so far in 2010 against the AFC North following a 38-24 win vs. Cincinnati (9/12) and a 23-20 overtime win vs. Baltimore (10/17).

PATRIOTS VS. BROWNS

SERIES HISTORY

The Patriots and Browns will meet for the 22nd time overall when the clubs square off on Sunday.

The Patriots have won the last four games dating back to 2001.

Cleveland leads the all-time series with a 12-9 mark, including one postseason game when the Bill Belichick-led Browns claimed a 20-13 victory over the Patriots on New Year's Day, 1995 in a Wild Card Playoff game at Cleveland's Municipal Stadium.

The Patriots and Browns played five times in a six-year span from 1999-2004 and then went three seasons before the last meeting in 2007, a 34-17 New England win at Gillette Stadium on Oct. 7.



The Patriots are 4-7 overall in games played in Cleveland, including a 2-1 record at Cleveland Browns Stadium. The Patriots' last visit to Cleveland was on Dec. 5, 2004 when New England took a 42-15 win. The Patriots have allowed the

BILL BELICHICK IN CLEVELAND

Patriots Head Coach Bill Belichick was the head coach of the Cleveland Browns for five seasons from 1991-95. Belichick took over with the Browns coming off of what was their worst season in franchise history, a 3-13 campaign in 1990. By 1994, Belichick had coached the Browns to an 11-5 record and a playoff berth. The Browns' 11 victories in 1994 are tied for the second highest single-season win total in the history of the franchise, and their playoff victory over the Patriots in the wild card round that season stands as the franchise's most recent playoff win. In 1994, the Browns allowed just 204 points – the fewest points allowed in the NFL that season and the fewest points allowed by a defense coached by Belichick. While with the Browns, Belichick hired a significant number of coaches and scouts who have gone on to have success in the NFL or college football. Belichick's hires have produced NFL head coach, college head coaches, and NFL personnel directors/general managers, among many others who have attained success in the football world.

The Patriots improved to 5-0 for the third time in team history with a 34-17 victory over the Cleveland Browns at Gillette Stadium. Tom Brady threw three touchdown passes – including two to tight end Benjamin Watson, who recorded his first career 100-yard receiving game and led the team with 107 receiving yards on six receptions. Sammy Morris paced the Patriots' potent ground game with 102 rushing yards on 21 carries. On defense, linebacker Junior Seau intercepted two passes and Asante Samuel added another interception, while Randall Gay scored a touchdown on a fumble recovery as the Patriots took advantage of a plus-four turnover differential and scored 21 points off turnovers. New England took a 20-0 halftime lead, scoring 14 points off of two Cleveland turnovers.

A 65-yard touchdown pass from QB Tom Brady to WR Brandon Tate on a broken play and the first two-touchdown game by RB BenJarvus Green-Ellis helped push the Patriots to a 28-18 win at home against the visiting Minnesota Vikings.

Green-Ellis had a career day, finishing with 112 yards on 17 carries for a 6.6-yard average along with a 13-yard touchdown run in the third quarter and a 2-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter. Tate's 65-yard touchdown was his first NFL receiving touchdown. He registered his first 100-yard receiving day after finishing with three receptions for 101 yards.

After a scoreless first quarter, Minnesota took a 7-0 lead on the first play of the second quarter to complete a 12-play drive. New England responded with an 8-play, 75-yard drive that was culminated when RB Danny Woodhead took a direct snap and ran the ball in for a 3-yard touchdown. Rookies Brandon Spikes and Jermaine Cunningham combined to stop Minnesota RB Adrian Peterson on a fourth-and-goal situation from the New England 1-yard line with 1:07 left in the second quarter, keeping the Vikings from taking a lead and preserving a 7-7 halftime tie.

After Minnesota opened the second half with a drive that ended in a field goal for a 10-7 advantage, Brady scrambled following heavy pressure from the Vikings and connected with Tate on a play that resulted in a 65-yard touchdown to give the Patriots a 14-10 lead. Later in the third quarter, rookie CB Devin McCourty had a game-changing play when he intercepted a Brett Favre pass intended for WR Percy Harvin at the Patriots' 26-yard line and returned it 37 yards to the Vikings' 37-yard line. That play helped set up a 4-play, 37-yard drive that ended in a 13-yard touchdown run by Green-Ellis for a 21-10 lead.

Minnesota closed the Patriots lead to 21-18 with 7:34 left in regulation. Favre left the game with an injury after the Vikings reached the New England 3-yard line, and backup QB Tavaris Jackson threw a 1-yard touchdown pass on this first pass and a 2-point play on his second play, but he did not get the ball back until 1:56 left to play.

Green-Ellis gained 62 yards on seven carries on the Patriots' final fourth quarter drive that extended a 3-points lead to a 10-point lead when Green-Ellis scored on 2-yard run to give the Patriots a 28-18 lead.

PATRIOTS OFF TO A HOT START ONCE AGAIN

The Patriots have started the season with at least six wins in their first seven games for the sixth time in team history and the fourth time under head coach Bill Belichick after improving to a 6-1 record with the win over the Vikings. The Patriots started the season 6-1 in 1974, 1980, 2004 and 2006. In 2007, New England started the season 7-0.

GOOD AGAINST THE NFC, ESPECIALLY AT HOME

The Patriots have now won 16 straight games at Gillette Stadium against NFC opponents. The only time in Gillette Stadium history that the Patriots lost to an NFC team was in the very first game against an NFC opponent at the new stadium in 2002 when the visiting Green Bay Packers beat the Patriots, 28-10, on Oct. 13.

GREEN-ELLIS SCORED 2 TDS, REACHES END ZONE IN FIFTH STRAIGHT GAME

RB BenJarvus Green-Ellis scored two touchdowns, hitting paydirt on a 13-yard TD run in the third quarter and a 2-yard TD run in the fourth quarter. It was the first multiple-touchdown game of Green-Ellis's career. He set a career-high after pushing his total to 6 TDs on the year. It was his fifth consecutive game with a rushing touchdown. He had a stretch of four straight games with a rushing touchdown as a rookie in 2008. The Patriots record for most consecutive games with a rushing touchdown is seven by Curtis Martin in 1996.

GREEN-ELLIS HITS CAREER-HIGH TOTAL

Green-Ellis had a career-high 112 rushing yards on 17 carries (6.6-yard avg.) for his second 100-yard rushing game, joining his 105-yard effort (on 26 carries) against Buffalo on Nov. 9, 2008. Green-Ellis was the first Patriots player to break the 100-yard rushing plateau since Oct. 18, 2009, when Laurence Maroney had 123 yards on 16 carries in the Patriots' 59-0 win over Tennessee. Green-Ellis's yardage total against Minnesota included 62 yards on seven carries on the Patriots' final fourth quarter touchdown drive that extended a 3-point lead to a 10-point cushion late in the fourth quarter.

MCCOURTY'S BIG PLAY MARKS HIS SECOND CONSECUTIVE GAME WITH AN INTERCEPTION

Rookie cornerback Devin McCourty had a game-changing play when he intercepted a Brett Favre pass intended for Percy Harvin at the Patriots' 26-yard line and returned it 37 yards to the Vikings' 37-yard line. The Patriots were clinging to a 14-10 third-quarter lead at the time of McCourty's interception, and the takeaway set up a 4-play, 37-yard drive that ended in a Patriots touchdown and a 21-10 lead with 2:25 left in the third quarter. The Vikings game was McCourty's second straight game with an interception.

BRANDON TATE SETS CAREER-HIGH WITH A 65-YARD TD CATCH

Brandon Tate scored his first NFL receiving touchdown on a 65-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady in the third quarter. It is the longest reception of Tate's career and the seventh-longest completion of Brady's career. Tate also had a 32-yard reception from Brady in the second quarter, finishing with three catches for 103 yards, marking his first career 100-yard receiving game.

BRADY-TO-TATE FOR LONGEST PLAY FROM SCRIMMAGE IN 2010

Brandon Tate's 65-yard touchdown reception in the third quarter was the Patriots' longest play from scrimmage in 2010 and was the team's longest play from scrimmage since Dec. 6, 2009, when Sam Aiken hauled in an 81-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady at Miami.

MIKE WRIGHT HAS FOURTH STRAIGHT GAME WITH A SACK

Mike Wright was credited with a 10-yard sack in the fourth quarter for his fourth straight game with a sack. The last Patriots player to have four full sacks in four consecutive games was Roosevelt Colvin, who accomplished the task in 2005 with a four game streak beginning on 11/27 at Kansas City, and ending 12/17 against Tampa Bay. Colvin also recorded a half sack in the fifth game (12/26 at NYJ) giving him 4.5 sacks through five games.

MAYO HAS FOURTH STRAIGHT GAME WITH 10-PLUS TACKLES

LB Jerod Mayo had his fourth-straight game with 10-plus tackles after finishing with 17 tackles against Minnesota. Mayo became the first Patriots player to go four consecutive games with 10-plus tackles since Teddy Bruschi had four straight games with 10-plus tackles in 2003. Mayo had 17 tackles at Miami (10/4), 19 vs. Baltimore (10/17) and 12 at San Diego (10/24). Sunday's game was Mayo's fifth game in 2010 with 10-plus tackles. He had 11 in the opener vs. Cincinnati (9/12). Bruschi was the last Patriot to record four consecutive games of at least 10-plus tackles. Bruschi accomplished the feat in 2003 starting 9/21/03 against the N.Y. Jets and ending 10/12/03 vs. the N.Y. Giants.

PATRIOTS HAVE 100-YD RUSHER AND RECEIVER

BenJarvus Green-Ellis ran for 122 yards on 17 carries with two touchdowns, while Brandon Tate had three receptions for 101 yards and a touchdown. The Patriots had a 100-yard rusher and a 100-yard receiver in the same game for the first time since Oct. 18, 2009 vs. Tennessee, when Wes Welker had 10 catches for 150 yards and two touchdowns and Laurence Maroney had 16 rushes for 123 yards and a touchdown.

ROBERT KRAFT NEWS & NOTES

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In 16 seasons of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.311 pct.) and recording the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won nine division titles, five conference crowns and three Super Bowl championships. The Patriots have made five Super Bowl appearances since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other NFL franchise has earned more than three berths.

SELLOUT STREAK

In the early 1990s, the Patriots seemed destined for relocation until Robert Kraft's purchase of the team rejuvenated local interest. In 1991, the season ticket base was just 17,635, barely enough to support the club. Now, the season-ticket base stands at a capped total of 61,759 and more than 50,000 fans are on a waiting list. The Patriots have sold out 176 consecutive home games (dating back to the 1994 regular-season opener).

SUCCESS STORY

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have been one of the NFL's elite franchises. Over the first 16 seasons of Kraft's ownership, the Patriots own the NFL's highest winning percentage and have won more Super Bowl titles, more conference championships and more playoff games than any other NFL team. The Patriots have now won nine or more games in 13 of the 16 seasons that Robert Kraft has owned the team.

Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win three Super Bowl titles in a four-year span. He spent 20 years as an assistant coach in the NFL and this is his 16th season as a head coach. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the only man in NFL history to serve 20 or more seasons as an assistant coach and at least 15 seasons as a head coach. Over a 100-game span from 2003-08, Belichick directed the team to an 82-18 record, marking the best 100-game span for any team in NFL history. In the 2007 season, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in the NFL's 90-year history and the first since the NFL established a 16-game schedule in 1978. He has led the Patriots to the Super Bowl four times and has produced seven division championships, including five straight from 2003-07. Belichick's Patriots teams own the all-time NFL records for consecutive total victories (21 from 2003-04), and established the record for consecutive regular-season victories (21 from 2006-08) and consecutive playoff victories (10 from 2001-05). Belichick owns the second-best postseason record in NFL history (15-5) and is the winningest NFL head coach since 2001 (127-42). From 2003-04, he directed the Patriots to back-to-back Super Bowl titles while posting consecutive 17-win campaigns. Belichick has spent more seasons in the league than any other current NFL head coach, and in that time has been a part of five Super Bowl championship teams. His overall record of 132-53 with the Patriots gives him the most victories and the best winning percentage of any head coach in franchise history.

ELITE COMPANY

Bill Belichick is one of nine NFL head coaches to win three or more championships since the league began postseason play in 1933. With the Patriots' victory in Super Bowl XXXIX, Belichick joined an exclusive club in which each of the eight other members has been enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

WELKER MOVES PAST FRYAR

Wes Welker moved past Irving Fryar (363) into fifth place on New England's all-time reception list and now has 386 receptions as a member of the Patriots. Welker passed Fryar on an 8-yard reception from QB Tom Brady in the third quarter vs. Buffalo (9/26/10). RB Kevin Faulk is in fourth place with 424 receptions.

WELKER'S ROUTE TO THE NFL

Despite being named the Oklahoma football player of the year by both *USA Today* and the *Daily Oklahoman*, Wes Welker's only scholarship offer came from Texas Tech, and only after a player that committed to Texas Tech backed out.

"I was thinking I'd get a scholarship somewhere," Welker said. "When it didn't happen when it was supposed to I was pretty hurt by it."

Welker had an impressive collegiate career, accumulating 259 receptions and eight punts returned for touchdowns. He even won a national award as the best special teams player in the country. Despite those accolades, he was passed over in the 2004 NFL draft and signed with San Diego as a free agent. He made the team, then was cut after the first game. He signed with Miami soon after and was used just on special teams. He caught New England's eye with a 71-yard punt return on Monday Night Football in a game against the Patriots. He was acquired by the Patriots in a trade with Miami in 2007.

WELKER TIES NFL RECORD FOR FEWEST INDIVIDUAL GAMES PLAYED TO REACH 100 RECEPTIONS

Welker reached 100 receptions in his 11th game of the 2009 season to tie Marvin Harrison for the fewest individual games played to reach 100 receptions in a season in NFL history. Harrison caught 100 passes in his first 11 games of the 2002 season en route to an NFL-record 143 catches. (Welker missed two games in 2009 due to injury).

DEION BRANCH RETURNS TO THE PATRIOTS

Deion Branch was acquired by the Patriots in trade with Seattle on Oct. 12, 2010. Originally a second-round pick of the Patriots in 2002, Branch was traded to Seattle in 2006. Branch returns to a team that he helped win two Super Bowls. Branch was awarded the Pete Rozelle Trophy as the Most Valuable Player of Super Bowl XXXIX. His 11 receptions in the game tied the Super Bowl record, also achieved by Jerry Rice, Dan Ross and Wes Welker. On the day of Super Bowl XXXIX, Deion called a dozen of his former football coaches to thank them for the support that they gave him throughout his high school, junior college and college careers. Hours after talking to his coaches, he tied the Super Bowl record with 11 receptions and was named MVP of the game. Branch has turned in his biggest performances on the greatest stage in sports, leading all receivers in Super Bowls XXXVIII and XXXIX. He recorded a combined 21 receptions in the two games and owns two of the top seven receiving performances in Super Bowl history. His career reception total in the Super Bowl ranks third all-time, trailing only Jerry Rice (33) and Andre Reed (27).

MAYO ON HIGH TACKLE PACE

LB Jerod Mayo has 94 total tackles in 2010 and is on pace for a career-high 215 total tackles. That number will be the highest since LB Clayton Weishuhn had 229 tackles in 1983. Mayo had 139 tackles as a rookie in 2008 and 114 in 2009. If he reaches 100 tackles in 2010, he will be the first Patriots player to have three consecutive 100-tackle seasons since Lawyer Milloy registered five straight 100 tackle seasons from 1997 through 2001. BRANDON TATE HAS TWO KICKOFFS RETURNED FOR TOUCHDOWNS IN 2010

Brandon Tate has blossomed into a dual threat in both the return game and the receiving game this year. He has returned two kickoffs for touchdowns to provide the Patriots a spark on special teams, after returning the second half kickoff vs. Cincinnati 97 yards for a touchdown and the second half kickoff at Miami 103 yards for a touchdown. He is the first Patriots player to return two kicks for a touchdown in a season since Kevin Faulk returned two for a touchdown in 2002. The Patriots record for most kickoff returns for a touchdown in a season is three by Raymond Clayborn in 1977. His prowess for returns carries over from his collegiate days where he holds numerous NCAA and ACC career records including the NCAA career record for combined kick and punt return yards with 3,523. A native of North Carolina, Tate was a four-year return man for the Tar Heels. Tate suffered a knee injury against Notre Dame as a senior and missed the final seven games of the season. Tate joined the Patriots in the third round of the 2009 draft, but his rookie year was derailed by injury as he was placed on injured reserve on Nov. 14 after seeing action in only two games.

WOODHEAD GOES FROM DIVISION II TO THE NFL

Danny Woodhead was a standout at Division II Chadron State in Nebraska. He averaged 178.9 yards per game and totaled 101 rushing touchdowns during his collegiate career. Woodhead's outstanding junior and senior seasons earned him two Harlon Hill Trophies, the Division II equivalent to the Heisman Trophy. He is one of just three players to ever win two or more Harlon Hill Trophies, joining Texas A&M University-Kingsville running back Johnny Bailey, who won it three times (1987-89) before playing six seasons in the NFL for the Bears, Cardinals, and Rams. Valdosta State University's Dusty Bonner was the only other player to win the Harlon Hill Trophy multiple times (2000 and 2001). Cincinnati Bengals running back Bernard Scott (2008—Abilene Christian) joins Woodhead as active NFL running backs who have won the award. In his first game with the Patriots, Woodhead scored on a 22-yard run in the win vs. Buffalo (9/26).

EDELMAN GOES FROM STANDOUT QB TO WR

Julian Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo (Ca.) before transferring to Kent State where as a senior he completed 56% of his passes (153 of 275 passes for 1,820 yards) with 13 touchdowns. He was also the leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003.

WILFORK WEARS HIS HEART ON HIS NECK

Vince Wilfork wears No. 75 over his shoulder pads. Underneath hangs a gold chain locket for those who were number one in his heart: his parents. In 2002, parents David and Barbara Wilfork both passed away within five months of each other, leaving the then University of Miami star without his greatest support system. Wilfork, who lost his father to diabetes, has raised hundreds of thousands of dollars for diabetes-related causes. His annual draft day fundraiser, a bowling event he has held for seven years, is one of the signature fundraising events held by a pro athlete in New England. For his charity work, Wilfork was awarded the 2010 New England Patriots Ron Burton Community Service Award. While he will always cherish his National Championship and Super Bowl rings, his constant reminder lies closest to his heart, a picture of his late parents at their high school prom. "I carry them with me wherever I go", Wilfork said of his parents' keepsake. "My parents pushed me to be the best I could be. The things I do and my wife does, we do out of the kindness of our heart, and we do it for the community. I never look for anything in return. My teammates are my second family. My kids, my wife, the New England Patriots – that's all I have."

ZOLTAN MESKO: COMING TO AMERICA

Rookie P Zoltan Mesko was born in Timisoara, Romania, on the Romania-Hungary border. On Many occasions in 1989, during the communist revolutions, his family was forced to take cover by diving on the floor to avoid gun shots from the armies. Even after the fall of the Berlin Wall, his family lived in poverty. His family was finally able to escape Romania when his father won a United States Permanent Resident Card (green card) in the Diversity Immigrant Visa Lottery in 1997 when Mesko was 11.

MESKO DISCOVERS FOOTBALL

An avid soccer player from his days in Romania, Mesko had a strong leg. It was only when he came to America that he discovered his leg could take him places. In eighth grade, Mesko was playing kickball in the gym when he kicked the ball so high that he broke a light fixture. He was given a choice: pay for the light fixture or play football. With his family still struggling with money and football being a more popular sport than soccer at his school, the choice was an obvious one—Mesko decided to play football. His leg would land him numerous Division I Scholarships and admission offers from Ivy League schools. From these, Mesko chose to play football at Michigan.

DOUBLE TROUBLE: CB DEVIN MCCOURTY

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, CB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, is a cornerback with Tennessee, selected in the sixth round of the 2009 NFL Draft. The two are the 11th set of twins to play in the NFL. Devin and Jason were cornerbacks in the Rutgers secondary from 2005-08. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and therefore was a year behind his brother in eligibility. McCourty is the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother Wasswa played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox.

ALL IN THE FAMILY: TE ROB GRONKOWSKI

Rookie TE Rob Gronkowski grew up playing football against his brothers in the backyard. Now, he has a chance to play against them in the NFL. Dan Gronkowski, the oldest of the bunch, is currently in his second season as a TE for the Denver Broncos, while 23-year old Chris is currently a rookie with the Dallas Cowboys as a fullback. The Gronkowskis are among 22 different sets of brothers currently in the NFL, yet they are the only family that can claim to have three siblings in the league. According to the Pro Football Hall of Fame, the Gronkowski brothers join nine other families to have at least three brothers playing at the same time.

The event allows for participants to test their clay shooting skills against a host of celebrities, including members of the New England Patriots as well as stars from TV and movies. The Light Foundation was established in 2001 and strives to instill the values of responsibility and hard work to youths.

READ BETWEEN THE LINES

The Patriots teamed up with Ahern Middle School in Foxborough on June 9 to introduce "Read Between the Lines," a new program featuring Patriots offensive and defensive linemen to promote the school's "Summer Reading Blitz." Every student in attendance received a "Read Between the Lines"



playbook and was encouraged to set their personal reading goals of at least two books this past summer. If the 923 students collectively read more than 2010 books over the summer, a Patriots lineman promised to return for another assembly to reward the students. On Sept. 28, Stephen Neal returned to the school to reward the students who accomplished their summer reading goals. One student received a "game ball" for her efforts after reading 70 books.

LIKE FATHER LIKE SON

WR Matthew Slater spent his college days at UCLA. The third-year promising young talent was born in 1985, when another Slater in The City of Angels was named to his second of seven Pro Bowls. Matthew's father, Jackie Slater, a Hall of Fame offensive tackle, spent his entire career with the Rams organization in LA. Matthew Slater, drafted in 2008, is one of six sons of Hall of Fame members to be drafted in NFL history.

GREETINGS FROM KAARST, GERMANY: SEBASTIAN VOLLMER MAKES HIS MARK

A native of Kaarst, Germany, Vollmer did not begin playing football until the age of 14 when he started playing for the Dusseldorf club team. Vollmer helped lead his German prep school team to two national football championships. His early football success landed him an appearance in the 2004 Global Junior Championships in San Diego, which led him to a scholarship at Houston. He spoke almost no English when he signed with Houston, but he became fluent in the language as he developed from a 250-pound tight end into a 315-pound lineman who started his final 25 games at tackle for the Cougars. Vollmer's collegiate career created interest from the NFL where the Patriots drafted him in the second round of the 2009 draft. Earned the nickname, Seabass, during his playing days at Houston. The nickname has carried over to the NFL.

PATRICK CHUNG'S JOURNEY TO THE NFL

Long before S Patrick Chung picked up flag football as a teen, his mother, Jamaican recording artist Sophia George, had preached about being a tough man in a song. Her hit single, "Girlie Girlie" – a traditional reggae song about poking fun at a boy who was not man enough – topped the charts in 1985. Chung is aware that among his talents he was born with, speed and agility, singing is not one of them. Chung, who possesses a great sense of pride in his unique heritage – his mother is Jamaican and his father is half Jamaican and half Chinese, was born in Jamaica and moved to California at age 12 where he started to play football as a freshman in high school. Chung went on to star at Oregon, where he holds the distinction of starting more games than any other defensive player in school history with 51 starts. He original entered the draft as junior but ultimately decided to return for his senior season. Pinned to the back of his locker is a reminder of the support he has gotten to this stage, a Jamaican flag that indicates his family's importance to him.



THE TEAM OF THE DECADE

When Robert Kraft purchased the New England Patriots in 1994, few would have thought that just 16 years later the franchise would be the undisputed team of the decade in the first decade of the new millennium. Kraft brought a winning vision to the organization and dedicated his resources to building a consistent winner. On Jan. 27, 2000, Kraft hired Bill Belichick to coach the team, and three months later the team drafted then-unheralded quarterback Tom Brady, putting the final pieces in place for the Patriots to become the most successful NFL team of the 2000s.
