NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (2-2) vs. TENNESSEE TITANS (3-1)

Sunday, Oct. 5, 2003 ★ Gillette Stadium (68,436) ★ 1:00 p.m.

The Patriots return home to Gillette Stadium to face the Tennessee Titans this week, beginning a stretch of three home games in four weeks. New England enters its October homestand with a 2-2 record and a share of second place in the AFC East, a half-game behind the 2-1 Miami Dolphins. The Patriots finished the opening month of the season with a .500 record despite a rash of injuries and a schedule that sent them on the road in three of the first four weeks of the season. This week against Tennessee, the Patriots hope to have a solid start to the season's second month.

The Patriots defense showed tremendous resiliency last week by allowing the Redskins just 21 total yards in the final 19:45 of the tight 20-17 loss, but it will have its hands full this week as it faces the NFL's top-ranked quarterback, Steve McNair. The Titans' signal caller leads the league with a 110.9 passer rating, but the Patriots defense has shown an ability to cool off hot offenses. Last week, despite missing four opening-day starters due to injury, New England held Washington quarterback Patrick Ramsey to his lowest passing output of the season and held Redskins wide receiver Laveranues Coles to just 62 yards, breaking his string of three straight 100-yard receiving games.

On offense, the Patriots will look to continue their momentum from last week, when Tom Brady threw for 289 yards, his biggest output in 11 games. The Patriots rushing attack chalked up more than 100 yards for the third time in four games last week, but will run into a Titans defense that ranks third in the NFL against the run (63.3 ypg).

Next week, the Patriots will continue their homestand at Gillette Stadium against the New York Giants (Oct. 12) before traveling to Miami (Oct. 19). New England returns home to close out the month with its third October home game on the 26th of the month against Cleveland.

TELEVISION: This week's game will be televised by CBS. The game can be seen locally on WBZ-TV Channel 4 in Boston. **Gus Johnson** will handle the play-by-play duties and **Brent Jones** will provide analysis. Following the game, the Fifth Quarter postgame show can be seen on WBZ-TV.

RADIO: WBCN 104.1 FM is the flagship station for the Patriots Rock Radio Network. Play-by-play broadcaster **Gil Santos** is in his 27th season as the voice of the Patriots, and calls the action along with Patriots Hall of Famer **Gino Cappelletti**. In 2003, Santos and Cappelletti celebrate their 20th season as a broadcast tandem. A complete listing of WBCN's Patriots Rock Radio Network affiliates can be found on page 8 of this press release.

SOUTHERN HOSPITALITY

The Patriots have an all-time record of 60-41-1 (.593) against the teams that make up the AFC South. It is the only division in the NFL where the Patriots own a winning record against all of the teams they have played. New England owns winning marks against Tennessee (18-16-1), Indianapolis (39-24) and Jacksonville (3-1). The Patriots will meet the Houston Texans for the first time this season (11/23). In 2003, the Patriots will play each of the four AFC South teams, hosting Tennessee this week, then traveling to Houston (11/23) and Indianapolis (11/30) in back-to-back weeks in late November. New England closes out its slate against the south by hosting Jacksonville on Dec. 14.

NAIL BITERS


The Patriots lost a tight game for the first time in a while last week when they dropped a nail-biter against the Redskins, 20-17. It was the first time the Patriots had lost a game decided by five points or less since Dec. 24, 2000, when they fell to the Miami Dolphins, 27-24. Since that time, the Patriots had won all eight of their games decided by five or less, including wins over Oakland (16-13) and St. Louis (20-17) in the 2001 postseason. The Patriots won three games by five points or less in each of the past two seasons. Six of the eight wins during the streak were decided in overtime. Even including last week's game, the Patriots are still 11-2 in their last 13 games decided by five points or less.



THIS WEEK: PATRIOTS VS. TITANS

SERIES HISTORY

The New England Patriots and Tennessee Titans will play for the 36th time this week, dating back to the days of the Boston Patriots and Houston Oilers of the American Football League. The Patriots have an overall lead in the all-time series, holding an 18-16-1 advantage. The teams played twice each year from 1960-1969 in the AFL, and have played 14 times since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970. In those 14 post-merger games, the Patriots have an 8-6 record. Since the Titans have played in Tennessee, the Patriots have played them twice, taking a 27-16 win at Foxboro Stadium in 1998 and dropping a 24-7 decision in Tennessee last season on Monday Night Football. The Patriots have had significant recent success against the Titans in Foxborough, coming out on the winning end five of the last six times the Titans have traveled to New England. The teams have met once in the playoffs, with the Oilers spoiling the Patriots' first home playoff game in club history with a 31-14 win in 1978.

THE LAST TIME

Tennessee 24, Patriots 7 – December 16, 2002

The Patriots fell to 8-6 with a tough loss to the Titans at The Coliseum in Nashville on Monday Night Football. Each team went into the game on a roll, with the Patriots having won five of their last six games and the Titans having taken seven of their last eight contests. But it was the Titans who kept their momentum going, winning the pivotal battle, qualifying for the playoffs, and proceeding to advance all the way to the AFC Championship Game.

Steve McNair paced the Titans with two touchdown runs in the second quarter to give Tennessee a 14-0 halftime lead. Eddie George helped the Titans control the clock, rushing 31 times for 101 yards, and safety Rich Coady returned an interception 24 yards for a third-quarter touchdown to put Tennessee in form command in the third quarter. For the Patriots, Tom Brady provided one of the evening's few bright spots, rushing for his first career touchdown on a 10-yard run up the middle in the third quarter.

The teams battled to a scoreless first quarter, as the Patriots forced a missed Tennessee field goal on the home team's first possession. The clubs were locked in a field position battle for the remainder of the first quarter, but the Titans broke onto the board first on McNair's first touchdown run of the night, an 11-yard scamper that put the Titans up 7-0. Two Titans possessions later, McNair struck again with a 1-yard touchdown run, giving Tennessee a 14-0 halftime advantage.

The Patriots got things going on the first possession of the second half, driving 69 yards on six plays to close the gap to 14-7 on Brady's touchdown run. But after forcing Tennessee to punt, Coady intercepted the ball on the Patriots' very next play and returned it 24 yards for a touchdown and a 21-7 Tennessee lead. The Titans defense did not allow the Patriots to mount a successful comeback and held on for the 24-7 win.



THIS WEEK: PATRIOTS VS. TITANS

CONNECTIONS

- Patriots Head Coach **Bill Belichick** was born on April 16, 1952, in Nashville, Tenn.
- When he was Head Coach of the Cleveland Browns, Belichick hired **Jim Schwartz** in the scouting department. Currently, Schwartz is the Defensive Coordinator for the Tennessee Titans.
- Patriots outside linebackers coach **Rob Ryan** coached at Tennessee State for five years: running backs, 1989-91; linebackers, 1992; defensive line, 1993.
- Patriots quarterback **Tom Brady** ran for his first career touchdown as he called his own number on an audible and got the Patriots on the scoreboard with a 10-yard quarterback sneak up the middle at Tennessee. (12/16/02)
- Patriots quarterback **Rohan Davey** completed his first professional pass, a three-yard strike to **Daniel Graham**, on the final play of the game against Tennessee. (12/16/02)
- Patriots running back **Kevin Faulk** was selected by the Patriots in the second round of the 1999 NFL draft (46th overall). The pick was acquired in a trade with the Tennessee Titans in exchange for the Patriots second-round pick (52nd overall-John Thornton) and fourth-round pick (117th overall-Donald Mitchell).
- Patriots safety **Aric Morris** was originally drafted by the Tennessee in the 2000 NFL draft with their first of two fifth-round selections; in the three seasons he played with the Titans, Morris appeared in 47 games, earning 10 starts and recording 56 tackles (41 solos) and 1.5 sacks.
- Patriots defensive end **Anthony Pleasant** played his collegiate career at Tennessee State.
- While playing for the Buffalo Bills, Patriots running back **Antowain Smith** carried the load in the Wild Card contest against the Titans with 79 yards on 14 carries and two touchdowns, despite playing with a turf toe injury; In the game he picked up his first two touchdowns in postseason play on runs of four and one yards, becoming just the fourth Bill to score multiple touchdowns in a postseason game. (1/8/00)
- Titans head coach **Jeff Fisher** was on Chicago's injured reserve list in 1985 and was assisting Assistant Coach Buddy Ryan as an "unofficial" coach when the Bears beat the Patriots in Super Bowl XX.
- Titans wide receivers coach **Steve Walters** began his NFL coaching career with the Patriots in 1992, serving as defensive backs coach for three seasons. After coaching with the Patriots, Walters spent one season coaching at the University of Alabama and 11 seasons coaching for the New Orleans Saints, before returning for two seasons (1997-98) as a wide receivers coach for New England.
- Patriots tackle **Tom Ashworth** and tight end **Daniel Graham** were two years ahead of Titans running back **Chris Brown** at Colorado. Patriots tight end **Christian Fauria** and linebacker **Ted Johnson** also played at Colorado.
- Patriots safety **Aric Morris** played for four years at Michigan State with Titans defensive tackle **Robaire Smith**. Titans wide receiver **Derrick Mason** played for the Spartans three years ahead of the pair.
- Patriots linebacker **Mike Vrabel** played one class behind Titans running back **Eddie George** at Ohio State. Titans' rookie safety **Donnie Nickey** also played his collegiate career at OSU.
- Titans tackle **Brad Hopkins** and running back **Robert Holcombe** were separated by five years at their alma mater, Illinois. Holcombe and Patriots rookie cornerback **Eugene Wilson** were also separated by five years at Illinois.

PASSING PERFORMANCES

Tom Brady and Steve McNair will be squaring off for the second time in their careers. McNair's Titans took a 24-7 decision from Brady's Patriots in Week 15 last season. Although neither quarterback threw for a touchdown in last year's game, McNair ran for two touchdowns and Brady ran for a score of his own. Statistics for the two quarterbacks are listed below.

PATRIOTS – TITANS QUICK HITS

- The Patriots have defeated the Titans five out of the last six times they have met in Foxborough.
- Patriots Head Coach Jeff Fisher is 1-1 against the Patriots.
- Patriots Head Coach Bill Belichick is 4-7 against the Titans/Oilers (4-6 as head coach of the Cleveland Browns).
- This week's game marks the first time the Tennessee franchise has played in New England under the nickname "Titans." For their last visit in 1998, they were known as the Tennessee Oilers.
- Troy Brown is the only current Patriot to play for New England against the Houston Oilers (10/17/93).
- The Titans are one of just three teams that Tom Brady has played against but has a losing record. The Patriots are 0-1 against Tennessee with Brady as the starter. Brady has records of .500 or above against 15 different teams. Besides Tennessee, Brady is also below .500 against Denver (0-2) and Green Bay (0-1).
- The Patriots and Titans/Oilers are two of the 10 old AFL franchises. The Patriots play six of the other nine original AFL teams this season.

THIS WEEK IN PATRIOTS HISTORY

The Patriots have a 14-11 record in Week Five since the NFL went to the 16-game schedule in 1978. Below are some memorable moments in Patriots history from the week of Sept. 29 – Oct. 5.

Sept. 30, 2001 — On the day that Bruce Armstrong was inducted into the Patriots Hall of Fame, New England got its first win of the 2001 season, beating the previously-undefeated Indianapolis Colts, 44-13. Tom Brady got his first NFL start and led the Patriots to an impressive win at Foxboro Stadium that began an 11-3 run to finish the regular season en route to the team's Super Bowl XXXVI win.

Oct. 1, 2000 — Bill Belichick got his first win as head coach of the Patriots with an impressive 28-19 win in Denver, snapping a 32-year drought for New England in the Mile High City.

Oct. 3, 1999 — Terry Glenn set a Patriots record with 214 receiving yards (on 13 receptions) in a 19-7 win at Cleveland.

Oct. 2, 1977 — Raymond Clayborn returned a kickoff 100 yards for a touchdown in a 30-27 loss to the Jets at Shea Stadium.

Oct. 4, 1964 — Gino Cappelletti hit all six of his field goal tries in a 39-10 win at Denver, setting a Patriots record for field goals in a game.



LAST WEEK: REDSKINS 20, PATRIOTS 17

The Patriots showed a great deal of heart in rallying from a 20-3 deficit late in the third quarter, but their comeback bid was not enough to dig out of the hole, as they fell to the Washington Redskins, 20-17. New England scored the game's final two touchdowns and had the ball in Washington territory facing a three-point deficit with less than two minutes to go. But the Patriots could not get one last first down to put them in field goal range and Washington held on at home to improve to 3-1 and send the Patriots back to New England with a 2-2 mark.

Tom Brady led the Patriots offense with a productive day, completing an efficient 65.8 percent of his passes (25-38) for 289 yards, his highest yardage total since he threw for 328 yards last season in an epic comeback against Chicago (11/10/02). The Patriots ran for 106 yards, marking the third time in four games this season they have broken the 100-yard rushing barrier, a feat they accomplished five times all of last season. On defense, New England allowed the Redskins just 21 total yards in the final 19:45, allowing the offense to claw back into the game.

CLOSE CALL

The Patriots mounted a ferocious comeback bid, rallying from a 20-3 deficit late in the third quarter, only to come up just short on a drive for a potential game-tying field goal in the game's final minute. After a Washington touchdown made the score 20-3 with 5:15 left in the third quarter, Tom Brady proceeded to complete 14 of his next 17 passes for 176 yards over a span of 18:01 to rally the Patriots to within a field goal, 20-17. Brady connected on touchdowns to David Givens (29 yards) and Larry Centers (7 yards) to pull the Patriots back into the game. New England regained possession at the Washington 45-yard line with 1:39 left, but came up just short on a potential game-tying or game-winning drive.

BIG D

The Patriots defense played a big role in the team's comeback bid against Washington, limiting the Redskins to just one first down on their final four possessions as the New England offense clawed back on the scoreboard. After a Rock Cartwright touchdown plunge put the Redskins up 20-3 with 5:15 left in the third quarter, the Patriots defense forced the Redskins to go three-and-out on three of their next four possessions. Over that span, Washington mustered just 22 yards of total offense.

CENTERS OF ATTENTION

Larry Centers passed Steve Largent to move into seventh place on the NFL's all-time receptions list with a 7-yard touchdown catch with 2:14 left in the game. The grab was the 820th reception of Centers' career, moving him past Largent, who retired in 1989 with 819 career receptions. Centers finished the game with 821 career catches, making Irving Fryar his next target on the all-time list. Centers needs 31 more catches to pass Fryar (851 receptions) for sixth place on the list. Centers is already the NFL's all-time leader in receptions (821) and receiving yards (6,769) by a running back.

SACK ATTACK

Willie McGinest sacked Patrick Ramsey for a 10-yard loss after the Redskins had a first-and-goal from the Patriots' 9-yard line on Washington's first drive of the game. The sack set up a third-and-long and was key to forcing Washington to settle for a field goal. The sack was McGinest's team-leading third of the season.

SPREADING THE FIELD

Tom Brady completed his first five passes to five different receivers on the Patriots' first drive of the afternoon. Brady drove the Patriots 77 yards on 13 plays, ending in a 23-yard field goal by Adam Vinatieri that tied the game at three. The Patriots signal caller was 5-of-6 on the drive for 56 yards, including a 20-yard completion to Daniel Graham and a 13-yard strike to David Givens.

STANDING THEIR GROUND

The Patriots came up with a crackdown on defense midway through the second quarter. Washington quickly drove to the Patriots' 30-yard line, where they had a first-and-10 before the New England defense took over. First, Patriots safety Eugene Wilson dropped Redskins running back Trung Canidate for no gain. On second down, cornerback Ty Law's tight coverage on Washington wide receiver Rod Gardner forced an incompleteness in the end zone. On third down, cornerback Asante Samuel came up with a big play, reaching in to swat a pass away from Washington's Darnerien McCants. On fourth down, Dan Klecko blocked a 48-yard field goal try by John Hall to complete the Patriots' impressive defensive stand.

BLOCK THAT KICK

Dan Klecko blocked a 48-yard field goal attempt by John Hall with 6:48 left to go before halftime. It was the first block of Klecko's career and the first for the Patriots since Richard Seymour came up with a block against Minnesota on Nov. 24, 2002. Last season, Patriots opponents missed 14 field goals, as New England led the NFL in field goal defense. In 2002, the Patriots blocked three field goals, the first time they had blocked that many since the 1998 season. The Patriots have not had one of their own field goal tries blocked since the 1998 season.

QUICK HITS

- Troy Brown extended his streak of consecutive games with a reception to 61.
- The Patriots and Redskins combined for no touchdowns in the first half. It was the second straight game that neither the Patriots nor their opponent scored a first-half TD.
- The Patriots offensive line allowed just one sack on 38 passing plays and did not allow Tom Brady to be sacked until 7:12 remained in the game. The New England offense did not allow a sack in the first half, marking the third time this season they did not allow a sack in a half (second half at Buffalo, first half at Philadelphia).
- Rodney Harrison made a nice open-field tackle on Lavaruanes Coles with 1:29 left in the third quarter, wrapping up the Redskins wide receiver a yard short of the first down marker on third down, forcing a Washington punt and helping to preserve the Patriots' momentum as they mounted their comeback bid.

DAVID GIVENS

David Givens caught his first touchdown pass of the season on a 29-yard reception from Tom Brady with 2:13 left in the third quarter, cutting the Redskins' lead to 20-10. Givens made a nice catch despite close coverage in the corner of the end zone for his second career touchdown. As a rookie last season, Givens caught his first NFL touchdown on a 4-yard pass from Brady against Green Bay at Gillette Stadium (10/13/02). Today's touchdown grab was part of the most productive receiving day of Givens' young career. Through three quarters, Givens had grabbed four passes for 57 yards and a touchdown, including a 13-yard reception that brought the Patriots to the Redskins' 23-yard line, helping to set up an Adam Vinatieri field goal on the Patriots' opening drive.



S RODNEY HARRISON

(On the close loss to Washington last week)

"You can always take positives out of a negative situation. We're disappointed that we lost, but they made more plays than us. Ultimately, we need to understand that even though we have a lot of injuries, no one cares about that. No one cares about your injuries. Our opponents are not feeling sorry for us."

(On the difference in the defense from the first half to the second half against the Redskins)

"We just calmed down. We just relaxed. The first series, we were kind of excited and really just overplaying and we made a couple of mental errors and they were able to go down there and kick a field goal. After that, they hit us with a couple of screens, but other than that, there wasn't any one thing in particular that hurt us. We were able to hold down Laveranues Coles and that was one of our biggest goals."

(On whether there is a sense of continuity on the defense)

"It's still developing. It takes time to have that chemistry, especially with all the starters coming in and out. But we still have a core of guys, Richard Seymour, Tedy Bruschi and those types of guys. Everyone has to jell around those guys and we just have to bring it together."

(On the comeback against Washington)

"It was important for us to just give our offense a chance. That's all we wanted. As poorly as we played, we still had the opportunity to win at the end. That's all you can ask for. You just can't keep shooting yourself in the foot and turning the ball over and making mental errors. Ultimately, when you face good teams, they will expose you."

LB TEDY BRUSCHI

(On what the team needs to focus on in preparing for Tennessee)

"I think we need to play cleaner. We need to play mistake-free football without turnovers. I think turnovers hurt us. I think that defensively, we need to force turnovers. We're in a position right now where the defense has to make big plays. We've got to make big plays to give our offense good field position and maybe score for them sometimes."

(On whether there are any positives that can be taken from the loss in Washington)

"I'm a bottom line type of guy. Either you win or you lose. I won't try to make excuses for anything or make myself feel good about something because we did okay or anything like that. The question is did we win or did we lose? We lost the game, so that's the only way the guys in this locker room feel."

(On who is stepping up to replace the injured linebackers)

"I see guys like Larry Izzo coming in there, I see guys like Matt Chatham coming in there. I went down on a series against Washington and Larry Izzo came in and we didn't miss a beat. We were able to get off the field and force them to a field goal. Matt Chatham had to step in there also. Don Davis did a great job for us. Those guys are good football players also. When those guys are in there, they're expected to do well and they expect that of themselves also."

K ADAM VINATIERI

(On the decision not to try to kick a potential game-tying 55-yard field goal in the final minute against Washington)

"Looking back at it, I wish I had a shot at it. But, if you get a first down there and maybe make a big play, then you could score a touchdown and win the game rather than tie it up and play for overtime."

(More on the factors weighing into the decision not to kick)

"When you go into it, you kind of figure out what your range is going to be and that was kind of on the borderline of being a little further than what we would have liked. The fourth-and-three might have been easier to get than a 55-yard field goal."

QB TOM BRADY

(On the final play of the game against the Redskins)

"We had time to make the play. A lot of time it comes down to execution. And what more could you ask for than what we had? We came back. We did a good job of getting ourselves back in the game. The defense did a heck of a job of keeping it close. It just comes down on our shoulders. You get the ball with 1:40 left on the 45-yard line and you can't get a first down. That's a pretty bad feeling."

HEAD COACH BILL BELICHICK

(On the tight loss in Washington)

"This was obviously a game of missed opportunities. I don't think that is any secret. We had opportunities in all three phases of the game and unfortunately we just couldn't make enough plays to win yesterday. I think it is one of those games when you look back on it, every player and coach that participated in the game feels like, 'If I could have just done one thing differently or one thing better on this play, or that play, that it would have made a difference.' I am sure that we all feel that way, all of us that participated in the game. You carry those losses with you heavily when you invest a lot of time and energy into the game."

(On the team's toughness and whether there is any consolation in losing to the Redskins by such a slim margin)

"I think that we had a number of guys in the game play through some bumps and bruises. We had some guys go out and come back into the game. I think there is a lot of respect for the toughness of our team and a lot of the players in particular that displayed it yesterday at various points. At the same time, this game is measured in wins and losses, real wins and losses, and not in consolation prizes. It's not anything that I am into and I don't think it is anything our team is into."

(On the defensive performance last week in Washington)

"I thought overall there were times when our pass-defense and our pass-rush were adequate. Our third down defense was most of the time okay. It could have been better. We had some success in defending the running game but at other times, that could have been better too, [like] on some cut-back runs. There are always plays that you could play better and things we could have done better that would have helped in the game. I wouldn't say it was bad. We are looking to improve on it."



PATRIOTS NEWS AND NOTES

TEDY BRUSCHI: FULL TILT, FULL TIME

TEDY BRUSCHI has returned each of his last three interceptions for touchdowns, becoming the first player in team history to return three consecutive interceptions for touchdowns. Bruschi's three touchdowns came in a span of five games in which he played. Bruschi ranks second on the Patriots all-time list with three career picks brought back for touchdowns. Teammate Ty Law holds the club record with five interceptions returned to the end zone. Bruschi's last three interception returns are listed below.

THE RATING GAME
