NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (2-1) at WASHINGTON REDSKINS (2-1) Sunday, Sept. 28, 2003 ★ FedEx Field (86,484) ★ 1:00 p.m.

The Patriots (2-1) return to the road this weekend to face the Washington Redskins (2-1) at FedEx Field in Landover, Md. New England will look to continue its momentum after winning its last two games, including last week's 23-16 victory over the New York Jets in the home opener at Gillette Stadium. The Redskins, on the other hand, will try to get back on the winning track after their bid for a 3-0 start was foiled by the New York Giants in overtime last weekend. At stake for both teams is an opportunity to finish the opening month of the 2003 season with a solid 3-1 record.

New England enters this week's contest against the Redskins after showing a successful balanced attack last week against the Jets. The Patriots ran for more than 100 yards as a team for the second time in three games as Kevin Faulk and Antowain Smith combined for 134 yards on the ground. New England also showed proficiency in the passing game, as quarterback Tom Brady singled out tight ends Daniel Graham and Christian Fauria for a combined five catches for 86 yards against New York. The Patriots will face a challenge on defense, lining up against the Redskins offense, which is ranked number one in the NFL after three weeks, averaging 406 total yards per game. But New England's defense has been productive itself, as Tedy Bruschi and Asante Samuel have each come up with interception returns for touchdowns since Week Two.

The Patriots were in D.C. just six weeks ago for a preseason matchup with the Redskins, but have not traveled to Washington for a regular-season game since Oct. 25, 1981. The 22-year gap between trips is the longest for any Patriots opponent and spans 355 games, during which time the Patriots have played in 32 other NFL cities.

TELEVISION: This week's game will be televised by CBS. The game can be seen locally on WBZ-TV Channel 4 in Boston. **Greg Gumbel** will handle the play-by-play duties and **Phil Simms** will provide analysis. **Armen Keteyian** will provide reports from the sidelines throughout the game. Following the game, the Fifth Quarter postgame show can be seen on WBZ-TV.

RADIO: WBCN 104.1 FM is the flagship station for the Patriots Rock Radio Network. Play-by-play broadcaster **Gil Santos** is in his 27th season as the voice of the Patriots, and calls the action along with Patriots Hall of Famer **Gino Cappelletti**. In 2003, Santos and Cappelletti celebrate their 20th season as a broadcast tandem. A complete listing of WBCN's Patriots Rock Radio Network affiliates can be found on page 8 of this press release.

NATIONAL RADIO: This week's game will be broadcast nationally by Westwood One Radio. **Dave Sims** and **John Riggins** will call the action from FedEx Field.

PATRIOTS VS. NFC

New England has won seven of its last eight games against NFC opposition, dating back to the 2001 season. The streak includes the Patriots' Super Bowl XXXVI win over St. Louis. The Patriots have won four straight games against the NFC, including a 31-10 win over the Philadelphia Eagles in Week Two. New England posted identical 3-1 records against the NFC in 2001 and 2002.

THE END OF THE ROAD


The Washington game will mark the end of an opening month in which the Patriots will have played three of their four games on the road. New England will return home for the month of October, playing three of their next four games at Gillette Stadium. They will begin a two-game homestand against the Tennessee Titans (Oct. 5), followed by a clash with the New York Giants (Oct. 12).



THIS WEEK: PATRIOTS VS. REDSKINS

SERIES HISTORY

The Patriots will square off against the Redskins for the seventh time in the regular season and for just the second time since 1990. The Redskins have won the last five games in the six-game series. Three of the last five games have been decided by five points or less. The Patriots are playing in Washington in the regular season for just the second time in their history. The last time New England traveled to the District of Columbia for a regular-season game was on Oct. 25, 1981, when they were edged at RFK Stadium, 24-22. Since that time, they have played in 32 other NFL cities, including Los Angeles, which no longer has a team, and Baltimore and Houston when teams other than the current clubs played there. The Patriots have played 355 games since their last regular-season trip to Washington, including postseason contests. Despite their regular-season unfamiliarity, the Patriots have played the Redskins frequently in the preseason. The teams have tangled in the exhibition slate in each of the past six preseasons. The Patriots beat the Redskins in the 2003 preseason, taking a 20-13 win on Aug. 16. New England holds an 11-7 lead in the all-time preseason series, with a 6-2 lead in the eight games since 1994.

THE LAST TIME

Washington 27, Patriots 22 – October 13, 1996

The Patriots dropped to 3-3 on the 1996 season with a five-point loss to the Redskins at Foxboro Stadium. The Patriots brought a 16-10 lead into halftime, but a pair of Redskins touchdowns in the third quarter lifted Washington to a 27-22 win. After the loss to the Redskins, the Patriots won eight of their last 10 regular-season games to finish at 11-5, then won a pair of playoff games in Foxborough to earn a trip to Super Bowl XXXI.

Curtis Martin was the offensive star of the game for the Patriots, rushing 17 times for 164 yards and two touchdowns. Drew Bledsoe completed 23-of-48 passes for 222 yards and Gus Frerotte passed for a pair of touchdowns for Washington. For the Redskins, Henry Ellard led the way with eight receptions for 152 yards and a touchdown.

The Patriots got a pair of field goals by Adam Vinatieri to take a 6-3 lead by the end of the first quarter. The teams traded touchdowns before another Vinatieri field goal gave the Patriots a 16-10 lead at halftime. But Frerotte threw for a pair of third-quarter touchdowns to give the Redskins a 24-16 lead. The Patriots clawed back to within two points on Martin's second touchdown of the afternoon, but Washington got another field goal in the final minute to put the game away, 27-22.

UNFAMILIAR FOE

The Patriots and Redskins have faced off in the regular season just once since the beginning of the 1991 season. New England played Washington in 1996 in the teams' only meeting in the past 12 seasons. With the new NFL scheduling format that took effect last season, the Patriots and Redskins will now face off at least once every four years, eliminating the scheduling aberration. This season, the Patriots will get reacquainted with some old foes as they play four teams they have played two times or less since the beginning of the 1991 season.

KRAFT ERA SUCCESS

The Patriots have defeated 28 of the 30 different teams they have played since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. The Redskins are one of just three NFL teams the Patriots have not beaten in the Kraft Era. The list excludes the Houston Texans, whom the Patriots have never played. The Patriots have not defeated the Redskins since 1972, but have played them only once since 1994.

WE'RE BACK

The Patriots return to FedEx Field just six weeks after their 20-13 win over the Redskins in the preseason on Aug. 16. In a scheduling rarity, the Patriots play both the Redskins and the Philadelphia Eagles on the road in both August and September. New England won in Philadelphia in the preseason (24-12, Aug. 22) and in the regular season (31-10, Sept. 14). Before this year, the last time the Patriots played the same team at the same venue in consecutive months was in August and September of 2000, when the Tampa Bay Buccaneers traveled to Foxborough twice in three weeks.

- Patriots linebacker **Roman Phifer** recorded his 700th career tackle against Washington while playing for the St. Louis Rams (11/30/97).
- Patriots quarterback **Tom Brady** and Redskins tackle **Jon Jansen** were teammates at the University of Michigan.
- Patriots linebacker **Tedy Bruschi** attended the University of Arizona, as did Redskins running back **Trung Canidate** and Redskins linebacker **Antonio Pierce**.
- Patriots strong safety **Je'Rod Cherry** played at California with Redskins defensive end **Regan Upshaw**; Patriots rookie linebacker **Tully Banta-Cain** also played at California.
- Patriots quarterback **Rohan Davey** played in the same class at Louisiana State as Redskins tight end **Robert Royal**. Patriots defensive end **Jarvis Green** was a year ahead of the two, and running back **Kevin Faulk** also played at Louisiana State.
- Patriots fullback **Fred McCrary** played two years ahead of Redskins guard **Randy Thomas** at Mississippi State.
- Redskins defensive end **Regan Upshaw**, while playing for the Oakland Raiders, started at New England in the 2001 AFC Divisional Playoff Game at right defensive end and made five tackles, including one sack for a 7-yard loss. He also forced one fumble.
- Redskins punter **Bryan Barker** had a 60-yard bomb while playing for Jacksonville against New England (1/3/99), setting a Jaguars team playoff record and establishing his postseason personal best.
- Redskins safety **Matt Bowen** caught his first career interception against New England (10/13/02) while playing for the Green Bay Packers.
- Redskins guard **Randy Thomas** made his NFL debut against the Patriots while playing for the New York Jets.
- In his first season with Washington, defensive end **Bruce Smith** recorded a sack on the first play of preseason against New England (8/11/00).

PASSING PERFORMANCES

Tom Brady is facing the Redskins for the first time in the regular season. He has played against Washington three times in the preseason, winning the two games he started and compiling a 96.9 passer rating in the three games in which he played. Washington's Patrick Ramsey has faced the Patriots in each of the past two preseasons, losing in his only start and earning a 60.3 passer rating in the two games.

PATRIOTS – REDSKINS QUICK HITS

- The Patriots have not defeated the Redskins since 1972, marking their longest drought against any NFL team.
- The Patriots have not played in Washington since 1981. Since that time, they have played in 32 other NFL cities, including visits to play the Baltimore Colts, Los Angeles Rams, Los Angeles Raiders and Houston Oilers.
- The Redskins are one of just three teams (along with Seattle and Tampa Bay) that the Patriots have not defeated since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994.
- New England has won seven of its last eight games against NFC opposition, dating back to the 2001 season. The streak includes the Patriots' 20-13 win over St. Louis in Super Bowl XXXVI.

The Patriots traveled to Washington and came home with their fifth straight preseason win, raising their 2003 preseason record to 2-0 with a 20-13 win over the Redskins at FedEx Field. A pair of big plays proved to be invaluable to the Patriots cause. David Patten hauled in an 85-yard bomb from Tom Brady in the first quarter, and Bethel Johnson returned a kickoff 98 yards for a touchdown in the third quarter to provide some of the evening's highlights.

The Patriots wasted little time in getting things going, scoring a touchdown on their first offensive possession for the second straight week. After the New England defense forced the Redskins to punt from their own 4-yard line, the Patriots marched 40 yards in six plays, capped off by a 5-yard touchdown scamper by Antowain Smith that gave the Patriots a 6-0 lead. On the Redskins' ensuing possession, the Patriots forced a turnover in the red zone when Eugene Wilson intercepted a pass by Washington QB Patrick Ramsey at the Patriots' 3-yard line. Brady and the Patriots offense picked up the momentum, as the Patriots signal caller hit Patten on a deep route three plays later for an 85-yard touchdown toss and a 13-0 Patriots lead with just 8:17 gone in the game.

In the second quarter, the Patriots defense forced two straight three-and-outs before Washington got on the scoreboard with a 6-yard touchdown run by Trung Canidate to make the score 13-7. Patriots kicker Adam Vinatieri saw a lengthy 56-yard field goal try sail wide left as time ran out in the half, keeping the Patriots at a six-point advantage going into the intermission.

The second half saw the Redskins chip further into the Patriots lead when a John Hall field goal made the score 13-10 with 3:32 left in the quarter. But the Patriots responded immediately when rookie wideout Bethel Johnson stepped on the gas and returned the ensuing kickoff 98 yards for a touchdown to give New England a 20-10 cushion.

Washington did not go without a fight, but the Patriots defense was up to the task of preserving the fourth-quarter lead. The Redskins were forced to settle for a field goal after their first possession of the final quarter saw them earn a first down on the Patriots 18-yard line. Hall's 47-yard boot made the score 20-13, and the Redskins mounted a final drive at the end of the game to try for a potential game-tying (or game-winning) touchdown. But, Patriots safety Chris Akins intercepted a pass from Washington's Gibran Hamdan at the Patriots 25-yard line with 21 seconds left to end the Redskins chances and send the Patriots back to New England with a 2-0 preseason mark.

The Patriots scored a pair of second-half touchdowns to pull ahead of the Jets and win the 2003 Gillette Stadium opener by a 23-16 score. Running backs Kevin Faulk and Antowain Smith combined for 134 yards on 30 carries (4.5 avg.) for New England to grind out yards and consistently move the ball on offense. Tom Brady completed 15-of-25 passes for 181 yards and ran for a touchdown. The defense supplied the day's other touchdown, courtesy of a 55-yard interception return by rookie cornerback Asante Samuel.

The teams traded three field goals in the first two-and-a-half quarters to leave the game in a 9-9 deadlock with time ticking down in the third quarter. Then, Brady got the Patriots into the end zone not with his arm but with his feet, as he ran the ball in from one yard out to give the Patriots a 16-9 lead. On the Jets' possession after Brady's touchdown, Samuel continued the Patriots' push by picking off a Vinny Testaverde pass on the first play of the fourth quarter and returning it 55 yards for a touchdown and a 23-9 Patriots lead with 14:49 left in the game. But the Jets did not go down without a fight, needing just four plays after Samuel's touchdown to come up with a score of their own on a 29-yard touchdown pass from Testaverde to Wayne Chrebet to cut New England's lead to 23-16. The Patriots defense answered the call as the game wound down, forcing the Jets to miss a field goal, then allowing them just one first down on their final two drives to preserve the divisional win and improve to 2-1 on the season.

THEY SAID IT

HEAD COACH BILL BELICHICK

(On the team's overall performance)

"I was very pleased with the effort and the toughness and the grit that we showed there going down to the wire and making some plays in the third and fourth quarter when we had to do it. It was good to get [New York's 5-game winning streak in Foxborough] over with and good to get an additional win in the opener here at home."

(On rookie cornerback Asante Samuel)

"I think he has been a pretty solid playmaker since he has been here. He has got a knack for being around the ball. He is instinctive and he has got some quickness. The ball seems to find him or he seems to find the ball, however you want to look at it. I am not saying he plays perfectly, but he consistently seems to show up where the ball does."

QB TOM BRADY

(On the win over the Jets)

"Last year they came in and beat us up pretty good. Playing them up here, they had won five times in a row, so it was nice to break that streak. It was a divisional win and we're 2-1. Now we're going on the road to Washington and it's going to be a tough game. But it's better to be 2-1 than 1-2 when you're going on the road."

(On the progress of the running game)

"It has gotten better. I think those running backs are having confidence in the offensive line and the offensive line is doing a good job in opening holes for those guys. The more we can run, the easier it is going to be to pass. The running game a lot of times is the best thing that can happen for a passing game. It takes a lot of pressure off of those third-and-long situations too."

ROOKIE RETURNS

Rookie cornerback **Asante Samuel** made the most of his first career interception, returning it 55 yards for a touchdown with 14:49 left in the game to give the Patriots a 23-9 lead. Samuel tipped a Vinny Testaverde pass up in the air and then pulled it in and raced 55 yards down the sideline for the score. It was the first time a Patriots rookie returned an interception for a touchdown since Andy Katzenmoyer brought one back for 57 yards on 10/17/99 against Dan Marino and the Miami Dolphins.

RUNNING MAN

Tom Brady scored the Patriots' first touchdown of the afternoon on a one-yard run with 2:08 left in the third quarter. It was the third rushing touchdown of Brady's career and his second career score in the regular season. Last season, Brady ran the ball in from 10 yards out at Tennessee (12/16/02). Brady also scored a rushing touchdown in the 2001 Divisional Playoff Game against the Raiders, scoring the Patriots' only touchdown of the game.

GRINDING OUT YARDS

The Patriots ran the ball 36 times for 147 yards, averaging 4.1 yards per carry. They topped 147 yards just twice in 2002. It is the second time in three games this season the Patriots have broken the 100-yard rushing mark as a team. Last season, the Patriots ran for 100 yards or more in five of 16 games.

TIGHT END CONTRIBUTIONS

Patriots tight ends had a productive receiving day against the Jets, combining for five catches for 86 yards. **Christian Fauria** hauled in passes on consecutive plays in the third quarter totaling 40 yards. First, Fauria grabbed a season-long 28-yard completion from **Tom Brady**, then grabbed a 12-yard pass on the very next play to bring the Patriots into Jets territory. **Daniel Graham** added to the tight end production with a 31-yard grab on the Patriots' first offensive possession of the game, which led to a 24-yard field goal by **Adam Vinatieri**.

NO TD IN HALF

The Patriots and Jets combined for no touchdowns in the first half as the teams battled to a 6-6 halftime deadlock. The last time the Patriots and their opponents went into halftime without having scored a touchdown was on Nov. 10, 2002, when New England and the Chicago Bears entered the break tied at six. In that game, the Patriots fell behind by a 24-6 second-half score and rallied for a memorable 33-30 win. The last time the Patriots or their opponent did not score a touchdown in a half was on Nov. 28, 2002, when the Patriots and Lions each had no touchdowns in the second half of a 20-12 Patriots win on Thanksgiving.

CENTERS OF ATTENTION

Fullback **Larry Centers** took sole possession of eighth place on the NFL's all-time receptions list with his 815th career reception early in the third quarter. Centers passed former Redskins wideout Henry Ellard, who is now in ninth place on the all-time list. Next in Centers' sights is the mark held by Steve Largent, who is currently in seventh place on the all-time receptions list with 819 career receptions. Centers is already the all-time NFL leader in receptions and receiving yards by a running back.

THREE-FOR-THREE

Adam Vinatieri kicked a 47-yard field goal – his third field goal of the afternoon – to cap off a 10-play, 50-yard drive on the Patriots first possession of the second half to give the Patriots a 9-6 lead. Vinatieri had his first three-plus field goal afternoon since the 2002 season finale, when he was four-for-four, including a 35-yarder to give the Patriots a 27-24 overtime win.



OL DAMIEN WOODY

(On the difference between running backs Antowain Smith and Kevin Faulk)

"I think they bring different things to the table. Kevin's more of a shifty-type guy and Antowain's a power guy. They did a good job getting the yards that they did [against the Jets] and got going north and south and that's what we need. We need that to be more consistent since we're more of a ball-control offense."

(On playing guard as opposed to center)

"There's a lot of different thinking on it. I've never really played guard on a consistent basis, so it's going to take some getting used to. The only difference is that you don't have the ball in your hand. But, I just go out there and play ball. Whatever the coaches want me to do, I'm just going to go out there and do it to the best of my ability."

LB TEDY BRUSCHI

(On the team's positive attitude despite the injuries)

"What do you want us to do? Do you want us to come in here and hang our heads? We're not going to do that. What's happened has happened and the bottom line is whoever's playing has got to get the job done."

(On whether the veterans have to take on coaching roles with the younger players)

"I think that's the definition of a veteran. When you see a young guy next to you, no matter what their situation is, you help him out and give him the little tips that are the tricks of the trade."

(On whether there are really no rookies anymore since they need to step up)

"They've had a rookie camp, a mini camp, a training camp and an offseason, preseason and three regular-season games. I think they're pretty much ready now."

(On the play of Asante Samuel)

"Ever since he started here, he has always been in the right place for interceptions or passes defended. He's been in the right area. His training camp work and his preseason work is carrying over onto the field."

T MATT LIGHT

(On younger players filling in due to injuries)

"Being in their shoes, it's probably something they've been looking forward to. Obviously you don't want to get your playing time because somebody got hurt, but if you're called on, you just go in there and give it your all."

(On the readiness of the team)

"When we go out there and practice, everybody works hard. Everybody does their job. It doesn't matter who it is, whether it's a starting guy or whether it's his backup. Everybody gets on the same page and we work hard to prepare for the game."

(On whether his performance against the Jets was a "day at the beach")

"Usually when I go to the beach, I don't feel like this the next day. But, it was a good game for us. It was a big mental victory for us."

TE CHRISTIAN FAURIA

(On whether the offense feels pressure to put more points on the board)

"Even though the defense had some injuries, they still put some points on the board for us. We only had that one touchdown, and they got the interception and ran it back. Once we saw how well they were playing, that was good to see. They gave up a couple of plays, but never broke down."

K ADAM VINATIERI

(On how kicking is so important to winning)

"The way the league is now, there's so much parity out there and teams are so close that every game seems like it comes down to just a couple of points here and there. Even if it's a team that's supposed to win by a bunch, it usually comes down to just a couple of points. You never know when a big kick's going to make a difference, whether it's in the first quarter or the fourth quarter. You just always have to be ready to go."

(On whether you can work on consistency)

"When you go to practice, you have to try to make sure that even when you're practicing, you go in feeling the same way, always focusing and not going out there and messing around and taking practice like it doesn't matter. It actually does matter. Every time you go out there and do something you should be trying to get better."

(On kicking in bad weather)

"When the weather's bad, you just try to figure things out the best you can. Whether it's wind or snow or this or that, you just get the right cleats on and try to figure out what the wind's doing and then you try to stay focused and do the best that you can and know what your limits are. Coach Belichick and I have a really good relationship in the sense that I can tell him what I think my range is and we pretty much stay by that. Having good communication makes a lot of difference as far as that goes."

DL RICHARD SEYMOUR

(On the depth of the team)

"I think the rookies and the first-year players have come in and done a good job since training camp of knowing their assignments. The coaches put them to the test early on in training camp and throughout the week they always have a period [in practice] for the young guys as well. If their number is called, then they have to step up and make plays. As a veteran guy, you just have to do what you can do. You can't play for anyone else. You can only play for yourself. You have to go out and make plays and you can't worry about doing someone else's job as well."

(On the early-season injuries)

"It's unfortunate, but it's a part of life. Injuries happen, but it's unfortunate that it happened to this many guys on this team. We just have to try to pull together as a team and on defense the only way you can get that is to get everybody to the football."

HEAD COACH BILL BELICHICK

(On the divisional win against the Jets)

"I am really proud of our team and the toughness that they showed. They hung in there. There were some tight situations when it was 9-6, 9-9 and we came back and made some plays on offense and defense to move ahead in the game. Then we were able to finish off the game positively and make some stops on defense and run the ball on the last drive to end the game. There were a lot of good things there. There were a lot of things that, just in terms of playing in a tough division game like it always is with the Jets, I thought that we had a lot of guys step up and play well in that situation, so that was good."

(On Ty Law returning from his injury against the Jets)

"Ty is one of our tough competitive players. He loves to play. He is a great competitor. He really sucked it up and came back in there. One thing about Ty is no matter what his condition is, it doesn't seem to affect him. He has a mental toughness about him and he doesn't seem to let it affect him in the game whatever it happens to be. He has played through a number of situations like that since I have known him even going back to when I was here before. He is a tough guy, physically and mentally, and he is a good competitor."

TEDY BRUSCHI: FULL TILT, FULL TIME

TEDY BRUSCHI has returned each of his last three interceptions for touchdowns, becoming the first player in team history to return three consecutive interceptions for touchdowns. Bruschi's three touchdowns came in a span of five games in which he played. Bruschi ranks second on the Patriots all-time list with three career picks brought back for touchdowns. Teammate Ty Law holds the club record with five interceptions returned to the end zone. Bruschi's last three interception returns are listed below.

STINGY ON THIRD DOWN

The Patriots allowed the New York Jets just one third-down conversion in 13 tries (8.0 percent) in Week Three. It was the first time they had allowed just one third down conversion since Week Two of last season when the Jets were 1-12 on third downs. So far in 2003, the Patriots have allowed their opponents just 11 conversions in 41 third-down opportunities (26.8 percent). THE RATING GAME
