NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS vs. NEW YORK JETS

Sunday, Sept. 21, 2003 ★ Gillette Stadium (68,436) ★ 1:00 p.m.

The Patriots (1-1) will welcome the New York Jets (0-2) to Gillette Stadium this Sunday, opening their 2003 home schedule. New England is coming off of an impressive 31-10 win in Philadelphia that evened their record on the young season and proved their mettle as they rebounded from a season-opening loss. The Patriots have won five of their last seven home openers and are 9-3 (.750) all-time at Gillette Stadium.

New England will try to prove that its Week Two win showed fans what they can expect to see on a regular basis this season. The Patriots will try to keep up the momentum generated in Philadelphia by grabbing their first division victory and putting on a show for the home crowd. Despite recent success against AFC East teams (a division-best 10-5 since 2001) and their strong play at home, the Patriots will face a formidable challenge in the Jets, who have won in New England each of the past two seasons. Having split their season series with the Jets in each of the past two seasons, the Week Three battle in the Patriots home opener promises to be a hard-fought contest between divisional rivals.

TELEVISION: This week's game will be televised by CBS. The game can be seen locally on WBZ-TV Channel 4 in Boston. **Dick Enberg** will handle the play-by-play duties and **Dan Dierdorf** will provide analysis. **Bonnie Bernstein** will deliver reports from the sidelines throughout the game. Immediately following the game, the Fifth Quarter postgame show can be seen on WSBK-TV Channel 38 in Boston.

RADIO: WBCN 104.1 FM is the flagship station for the Patriots Rock Radio Network. Play-by-play broadcaster **Gil Santos** is in his 27th season as the voice of the Patriots, and calls the action along with Patriots Hall of Famer **Gino Cappelletti**. In 2003, Santos and Cappelletti celebrate their 20th season as a broadcast tandem. A complete listing of WBCN's Patriots Rock Radio Network affiliates can be found on page 8 of this press release.

HOME SWEET HOME

The Patriots will play their home opener at Gillette Stadium against the Jets this week. Since moving into the state-of-the-art facility in 2002, the Patriots have compiled a 9-3 record, including preseason games. Dating back to the 2001 season, the Patriots have won 13 of their last 16 games at home, including preseason and postseason contests.

PATRIOTS VS. AFC EAST

The Patriots are 9-3 in their last 12 games against AFC East opponents, dating back to the 2001 season. In 2002, the Patriots finished the season with a 4-2 record against their divisional rivals. Since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, New England has compiled an overall record of 131-132-0 (.498) against divisional opponents. The Patriots are 32-24 (.571) against the AFC East since the beginning of the 1996 season. The Patriots own the best record against AFC East foes since 2001 with a 10-5 mark. The Jets have the second best mark, going 9-6 against the division since 2001.

SWAT TEAM

The Patriots defense recorded 16 pass breakups last weekend in Philadelphia, the most since they batted away 16 passes on Nov. 11, 1984 in a 38-10 win over Buffalo and quarterback Joe Ferguson. Last weekend, Patriots defenders were consistently in position to break up Philadelphia quarterback Donovan McNabb's pass attempts, holding him to a career-low 39.1 percent completion rate (18-46). Tedy Bruschi led the swat team with five passes defensed, including an interception that he returned 18 yards for a touchdown.



THIS WEEK: PATRIOTS VS. JETS

SERIES HISTORY

The Patriots and Jets will meet for the 87th time since the series between the AFC East rivals began in 1960. The Patriots have won two of the last three games between the teams, with both victories coming at the Meadowlands. The Jets hold an overall edge in the series, but the two teams have each won nine games against each other since Robert Kraft purchased the Patriots in 1994. The teams have split the season series each of the past two years, with all games being won by the visiting team in both 2001 and 2002. Last season, the teams split their two games, with the Patriots taking a 44-7 win away from the Meadowlands on



Sept. 14 and the Jets posting a 30-17 victory at Gillette Stadium on Dec. 22. The teams also split their series in 2001, as the Jets won 10-3 at Foxboro Stadium and the Patriots were victorious at the Meadowlands, 17-16. The Patriots' longest winning streak against the Jets came when they won six straight games from 1994-97.

LAST SEASON'S RESULTS

New England 44, New York 7 – September 15, 2002

The Patriots scored 34 second-half points to roll to a 44-7 win over the Jets in Week Two at the Meadowlands, improving to 2-0. New England racked up 432 total yards and limited the Jets to just 32 yards rushing in off-and-on heavy rain. The Patriots secondary allowed the Jets wide receivers to make just three catches all afternoon, and came up with a pair of touchdowns on a fumble return by Tebucky Jones and a 90-yard interception return by Victor Green. On offense, Tom Brady led the Patriots on a franchise-long 19-play drive in the second quarter and threw a pair of touchdown passes, one each to Deion Branch and Cam Cleeland.

The first half was a stalemate until Brady broke the ice with a 1-yard strike to Cleeland midway through the second quarter. An Adam Vinatieri field goal as the half expired brought the Patriots into the break with a 10-0 lead.

In the second half, the Patriots scored on their first four possessions and also scored on a pair of Jets possessions to take control of the game. On New York's first possession of the half, Jones stripped Vinny Testaverde of the football, recovered the ball and then returned it 24 yards for a touchdown and a 17-0 Patriots lead. After another Vinatieri field goal, the Jets were driving when Green picked off Testaverde at the Patriots' 10-yard line and returned the ball 90 yards for a score and a 27-0 Patriots lead. The Jets clawed back with a touchdown to make it 27-7, but the Patriots added 17 more points in the fourth quarter on a 49-yard touchdown bomb from Brady to Branch and a 2-yard touchdown run by Kevin Faulk. Those two touchdowns were sandwiched around Vinatieri's third field goal of the afternoon and made the final score 44-7.

New York 30, New England 17 – December 22, 2002

The Patriots fell to 8-7 with a 30-17 loss to the Jets at Gillette Stadium on Sunday Night Football in Week 16. The brightest moment for the Patriots came from Kevin Faulk, who returned a kickoff 87 yards for a touchdown. Faulk set a club record with 220 kickoff return yards, averaging 31.4 yards per return. The game was tied at 17 late in the third quarter, but the Jets rattled off the game's final 13 points to take the win.

The Jets scored first, on a 32-yard pass from Chad Pennington to Laveranues Coles, but Faulk returned the ensuing kickoff 87 yards for his second kickoff return touchdown of the season to tie the score at seven. The Jets struck back with another touchdown late in the quarter to take a 14-7 lead. The teams exchanged field goals in the second quarter to give New York a 17-10 lead at the break.

New England opened the second half with a 16-play drive that ended in a 6-yard strike from Brady to Christian Fauria, tying the score at 17. But the Jets took the lead for good on a 23-yard field goal by John Hall, then rattled off 10 fourth-quarter points to seal the win by a final score of 30-17.

CONNECTIONS

- Patriots head coach **Bill Belichick** was the Jets' Assistant Head Coach/Secondary for three seasons (1997-99).
- As head coach of the Cleveland Browns, Belichick hired **Mike Tannenbaum** as a personnel intern. He is now the Jets' Assistant G.M./Director of Player Personnel.
- Defensive Coordinator **Romeo Crennel** was the defensive line coach for the Jets from 1997-99.
- Inside Linebackers coach **Pepper Johnson** played for two seasons with the Jets, before retiring in 1999. In his first season with the Jets, he was voted captain before the start of the regular season.
- Defensive Backs coach **Eric Mangini** served as the Jets Defensive Assistant/Quality Control coach from 1997-99.
- Special Teams coach **Brad Seely** held the same position with the Jets in 1994.
- Offensive Coordinator **Charlie Weis** coached for three seasons with the Jets (1997-Wide Receivers, 1998-Offensive Coordinator/WRs, 1999-Offensive Coordinator/FBs).
- Patriots Vice President of Player Personnel **Scott Pioli** was the Director of Pro Personnel for the Jets from 1997-1999.
- Patriots Guard **Joe Andruzzi** is from Staten Island, N.Y., where he was an offensive and defensive tackle at Tottenville High School.
- Patriots Tight End **Fred Baxter** was originally drafted in the fifth round of the 1993 NFL Draft (115th overall) by the Jets, for whom he played for eight seasons.
- Patriots Linebacker **Don Davis** originally signed with the Jets as a rookie free agent in the spring of 1995.
- Patriots Running Back **Kevin Faulk** set a career-high with a 95-yard kickoff return vs. the Jets (11/15/99). It was the eighth longest return – and the longest non-scoring return – in franchise history.
- Patriots defensive end **Bobby Hamilton** was signed by the Jets as a free agent and participated on their practice squad for the first season before being activated and staying with the organization for another four years.
- Patriots quarterback **Damon Huard** made his NFL debut against the Jets, while he was playing for the Dolphins, and connected on two-of-three passes for 21 yards.
- Patriots cornerback **Ty Law** scored his first touchdown, a 38-yard interception return against the Jets (12/8/96), as well as his first career fumble recovery (9/14/97).
- Patriots defensive lineman **Rick Lyle** signed with the Jets as an unrestricted free agent in March of 1997, where he remained for five seasons.
- Patriots linebacker **Roman Phifer** signed with the Jets as an unrestricted free agent on March 5, 1999, and stayed with the organization for two seasons.
- Patriots defensive end **Anthony Pleasant** played for the Jets for two seasons, during which time he recorded 31 starts out of his 32 appearances, 97 tackles, and 8.0 sacks for 63 yards.
- While playing for the Carolina Panthers, Patriots cornerback **Tyrone Poole** snagged his first career interception in the franchise's first win, 26-15 over the Jets (10/15/95).
- Jets Assistant Head Coach/Senior Offensive Assistant **Jimmy Raye** was the offensive coordinator for the Patriots in 1990.
- Jets defensive back **Jamie Henderson** was drafted in the fourth round (101st overall) of the 2001 draft in a selection from the Patriots as part of the compensation package for Head Coach **Bill Belichick**.
- Jets quarterback **Vinny Testaverde** started 31 games at quarterback for the Cleveland Browns from 1993-95, when **Bill Belichick** was the team's head coach.
- Jets running back **Curtis Martin** was originally drafted by the Patriots in the third round (74th overall) of the 1995 NFL Draft; in his three seasons with New England, Martin appeared in 45 games with 43 starts.

- The Patriots have five former Jets on their roster (Rick Lyle, Anthony Pleasant, Roman Phifer, Bobby Hamilton and Fred Baxter).
- Five Patriots coaches have also coached for the Jets (Bill Belichick, Romeo Crennel, Charlie Weis, Brad Seely, Eric Mangini).
- The teams have each won nine games in the series since Robert Kraft bought the Patriots in 1994.
- Bill Belichick is 3-5 all-time against the Jets, including a record of 2-4 as head coach of the Patriots.
- Herman Edwards is 2-2 in his career against the Patriots.
- Tom Brady is 2-1 as a starter against the Jets.

The Patriots evened their record at 1-1 with a solid 31-10 win on the road against the Eagles. Tom Brady bounced back from his opening day struggles by compiling his 10th career passer rating over 100.0, throwing three touchdowns without an interception and completing 68.2 percent of his passes (30-44) en route to a 105.8 rating. Christian Fauria picked up where he left off last season, catching a pair of touchdown passes in the second quarter. The Patriots defense had a strong afternoon, coming up with six Philadelphia turnovers, including an 18-yard interception return for a touchdown by Tedy Bruschi. The defense sacked Donovan McNabb eight times (the most he's been sacked in his career) and recorded 16 pass defenses against the Eagles signal caller.

THEY SAID IT

HEAD COACH BILL BELICHICK

(On the victory against the Eagles)

"That was a good effort by our football team and I'm really proud of the way we came together in all three areas. It's a tough assignment to come down here to Philadelphia and to play a good football team on the road. I was really proud of the way they played."

(On Tom Brady and the offense)

"I think Tom was well-prepared and he did a good job of reading the different coverages and blitzes that the Eagles ran. The receivers made some nice catches and Charlie [Weis] did a nice job with the play-calling to try to keep them off balance. He executed the offense well and it usually comes down to execution."

QB TOM BRADY

(On what he thought was the key to his success)

I think we had great field position. Our defense created great field position. We scored some points early off those turnovers to take the lead. We ended up scoring off that touchdown pass in the third quarter. At that point, we went up 17 points. At that point, they are running uphill.

(On the difference from Week One)

"I think we started to execute. We executed better. And certainly playing with a lead, we could take advantage of a lot of different situations."

SPREADING THE FIELD

Tom Brady completed passes to 10 different receivers against Philadelphia. He found four wide receivers, four running backs and two tight ends open. Reserve tight end Fred Baxter was the only eligible receiver not to catch a pass. Last season, Brady completed passes to 10 receivers on three occasions. He tied an NFL single-season record by completing touchdown passes to 11 different receivers in 2002.

TOMMY GUN

Tom Brady completed 20 of 29 passes for 177 yards and two touchdowns in the first half. It was the fourth time in his career he has completed 20 or more passes in a half. He did it twice in 2002, completing 23 of 39 passes in the second half at Chicago (11/10/02) and completing 20 of 31 attempts in the first half against Kansas City (09/22/02). In 2001, he completed 20 of 30 passes in the second half against San Diego (10/14/01). Including the 31-10 win in Philadelphia, the Patriots have won all four games in which Brady completed 20 or more passes in a half.

CHRISTIAN SCORIA

Christian Fauria caught two touchdown passes from Tom Brady in the second quarter, recording his second career two-touchdown game. He grabbed his first touchdown of the season on an 8-yard reception from Brady with 8:04 left in the second quarter to give the Patriots a 10-7 lead. Fauria grabbed his second touchdown of the quarter with 2:12 left before halftime on a 6-yard strike from Brady in the middle of the end zone. Last season, Fauria led the Patriots with seven receiving touchdowns and tied for tops in the NFL for touchdowns by tight ends. In 2002, seven of Fauria's 27 catches were touchdowns. His stat of one touchdown every 3.9 receptions led the NFL in 2002.

A SPECIAL PLAY

Bethel Johnson came up with a big special teams play with 3:03 left before halftime when he raced down the field and pounced on a fumbled punt to give the Patriots possession at the Eagles' 14-yard line, setting up Christian Fauria's second touchdown catch of the game. Johnson fell on a muffed catch by punt returner Brian Westbrook to give the Patriots possession.

TURNING OVER POINTS

The Patriots scored 21 points off of turnovers against the Eagles. Their first two touchdowns came off of turnovers in the second quarter. Ted Washington caused the first turnover, sacking Donovan McNabb for a 5-yard loss and forcing him to lose the ball. Roosevelt Colvin jumped on the loose ball and the Patriots scored their first touchdown four plays later on an 8-yard strike from Tom Brady to Christian Fauria. Later in the quarter, Bethel Johnson hustled down the field and pounced on a muffed punt by Brian Westbrook to give the Patriots possession. Two plays later, Brady and Fauria hooked up again for a 5-yard touchdown and a 17-7 Patriots lead. In the fourth quarter, Tedy Bruschi sealed the win with an 18-yard interception return for a touchdown.

BRANCHING OUT

Deion Branch snared a 26-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady with 7:07 left in the third quarter to give the Patriots a 24-7 lead. It was the third touchdown grab of Branch's career and his first since Week Two of last season (at N.Y. Jets). Last season, Branch won AFC Rookie of the Month honors for September and finished second among AFC rookies with 43 receptions for 489 yards, despite missing the final three games due to injury.

SACK ATTACK

The Patriots sacked Donovan McNabb eight times, their highest single-game sack total since they came up with nine sacks at Atlanta (11/04/01). Ted Washington came up with a big play when he sacked McNabb for a 5-yard loss and forced a fumble on the play, which Roosevelt Colvin recovered and led to the Patriots' first touchdown of the afternoon. Willie McGinest had a pair of sacks, getting his first sack of the season early in the fourth quarter when he brought McNabb down for a 5-yard loss. McGinest also dropped McNabb for a 7-yard loss later in the quarter. Tedy Bruschi got in on the action with a nine-yard sack in the fourth quarter, and Matt Chatham sacked McNabb and forced him to fumble in the fourth quarter.

LARRY CENTERS

Larry Centers grabbed his 814th career reception in the second quarter. With the catch, Centers tied Henry Ellard for eighth place on the NFL's all-time receptions list. Centers is the NFL's leader for career receptions by a running back. With just one more catch, Centers will pass Ellard and take over eighth place on the list. Centers needs to reach 820 catches to move ahead of Steve Largent into seventh place on the all-time list.



THEY SAID IT

WR DAVID PATTEN

(On the game against the Jets this Sunday)

"We play in a tough division. It doesn't matter what one team's record is. We know it's going to be a tough fought game. They're going out and looking for a win. We're coming out of a big win and we've got to put that out of our minds. We have to come out and play a solid game."

(On playing in front of the home crowd in the first home game of the season)

"It's always good to play at home, because you don't have to worry about traveling and you have the fans behind you. A lot of people make a big deal about it and sometimes as players we may say it doesn't really matter, but when you have your fans cheering for you and the excitement is in the air, it gives you a little push."

LB WILLIE MCGINEST

(On how satisfying the win in Philadelphia was for him)

"Winning solves a lot of problems. You can come to work and it feels good. It builds morale. That's one thing I said to the team after we lost to Buffalo, was to remember how you felt after you walked off that field in Buffalo. The bitter taste in your mouth and how that felt. If you think about that, nobody wants that. I'd rather have the taste in my mouth from the Philly game than from the week before."

SS RODNEY HARRISON

(On his playing style)

"I've been playing the same way since I was seven years old. You've got to play on an emotional high. You have to play with intensity and match the opponents' emotion level. Actually, you have to be more emotional than the other team. That's part of the deal. You have to play like you enjoy the game, like you're having fun. That's what I do."

(On whether he thought the defense played a perfect game in Philadelphia)

"Not at all. We played hard and were able to put some pressure on [Donovan] McNabb and harass him and confuse him a little bit. But, I've never seen a perfect game. Nothing even close to it. We had a bunch of mistakes, we broke down a few gaps and missed some tackles. It was far from a perfect game."

(On how the team can build from the win)

"Well, you go back and learn from it in the film session. But you have to treat it like last week. It was one game. You have 14 games and it's just one victory. That's what I emphasize all the time: It's one game. There's no need to get too high or to get too low. That's when you start believing in yourself and thinking that you're too good and then you can get shocked and end up 1-5."

WR TROY BROWN

(On whether he's "jealous" of Christian Fauria's touchdowns)

"Man, he doesn't want to share. [Laughter] It's all good, though, as long as we put the ball in the end zone and get some points."

(On the energy level against Philadelphia as compared to against Buffalo)

"There was a lot more enthusiasm out there than in Buffalo. Buffalo jumped on us pretty quick so we didn't have a chance to show anything. But those two games are in the past and now we're just looking forward to the Jets."

HEAD COACH BILL BELICHICK

(On the contrast between the first two games)

That is kind of like the story about the guy who has got one foot in a bucket of boiling water and the other foot in a bucket of ice water and you feel like he should be perfectly comfortable. I think each week is its own entity. I don't think last week necessarily affected us against Philadelphia and I am not sure that our performance against Philadelphia is going to have anything to do with how we play against the Jets. I think it will more depend on how focused we are this week in our preparations and how well we execute on Sunday during the game. That is what I think it will come down to this week regardless of whether we won or loss by whatever the score was the previous week. I really think that is what is at stake moving forward. The sooner we forget about Philadelphia and focus on the Jets, I think the better off we will be in terms of the Jets.

(On Jets quarterback Vinny Testaverde)

I have gone back with Vinny a long way. I have a lot of respect for what he did at Tampa. He was in a tough situation when he started down there. He came to Cleveland and led our team to a strong season in '94 and has played good football for a number of different organizations whether it be Cleveland, Baltimore and now the Jets, taking teams to the playoffs and championship games. I think that Vinny has got all of the talent in the world. He is a gym rat. He works hard. He has brought teams back from some of the most impossible situations that you can imagine to win. He has played a lot of good football through the course of his career and is a solid guy.

G JOE ANDRUZZI

(On his assessment of the team)

"We've got a good group of guys. We're ready to go out there and push it to the limit. We have good team morale and we want to get out there. If you talk to anybody on this team, nobody wants to lose, especially the way we did in Week One."

(On winning the Ron Burton Award for community service and on Burton passing away this past weekend)

"It was a great honor. He was a great inspiration and a great man who did a lot for the community. He did a lot for this team. My prayers are with his family. It was a tough loss for the whole area. He was very inspirational in what he did."

(On how big a part community service plays in his life)

"It's a big part. Personally, I've studied special ed and I've worked with kids. I love kids. I have three kids of my own. It's one of those things where when I'm done playing I want to be able to do something, I don't know what it is, but something towards that. Every little bit helps."

TE CHRISTIAN FAURIA

(On whether the team that won in Philadelphia was the "real Patriots")

"I think so. I think three quarters of it was the team that we think that we are and that we expect to be week in and week out. But I do think that that's the type of game that we want to play. The defense got us some turnovers, we capitalized on them and took a lead early that we kept the rest of the game."

(On what went right for him to catch two touchdowns)

"I guess that's my job. That's what I'm getting paid to do. We practice that a lot and they call it and everybody does their job. Tom chucks it in there and I just try to get my hands on it as quick as possible."

TEDY BRUSCHI: FULL TILT, FULL TIME

TEDY BRUSCHI has returned each of his last three interceptions for touchdowns, becoming the first player in team history to return three consecutive interceptions for touchdowns. Bruschi's three touchdowns came in a span of five games in which he played. Bruschi ranks second on the Patriots all-time list with three career picks brought back for touchdowns. Teammate Ty Law holds the club record with five interceptions returned to the end zone. Bruschi's last three interception returns are listed below.

THE RATING GAME
