**ADMINISTRATION****JAMES B.  
ORTHWEIN****Chairman  
of the Board**

On May 11, 1992, James B. Orthwein became the New England Patriots' Chairman of the Board when he purchased the majority interest in the club from Victor K. Kiam II.

The 69-year-old Orthwein is chairman of Huntleigh Asset Partners, a private investment partnership in Clayton, Missouri and a lifelong resident of St. Louis, Mo. In 1984, Orthwein co-founded the Huntleigh Asset Partners, L.P. In addition to substantial public market investments, the Partners have a majority interest in five private businesses: Huntleigh Securities, Inc., a securities brokerage company; Huntleigh/Byrne Investment Advisors, an investment advisory firm; Huntleigh/McGehee Incorporated, a full line insurance brokerage company; Huntleigh Telecommunications Group, a telecommunications business located in El Paso, Texas; and Jameson Leasing, an automobile leasing company. In addition, Orthwein is a member of the Board of Directors of Anheuser-Busch Companies, Inc.

Orthwein began his business career with D'Arcy Advertising Co. in 1947. In his first five years with the company, he worked in virtually every department and held the titles of copywriter, account executive, creative director and management supervisor. In 1952, he was elected vice president and in 1956 was named director. He was elected Chairman of the Board of D'Arcy in 1970 and later became Co-Chief Executive Officer following the merger with MacManus, John & Adams. Beginning in 1976, he served as Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of DM&M Worldwide, Inc. until his retirement from the agency in 1983.

Under Orthwein's leadership, DM&M Worldwide, Inc. achieved billing of more than \$1 billion and was ranked among the top 12 advertising agencies in the world at the time he retired.

In 1979, Orthwein was named the Southern Advertising Markets Man of the Year. The following year, he was honored with the Advertising Club of Greater St. Louis' silver medal.

He has served as a member of the Board of Directors of civic and philanthropic organizations, including the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra, the Missouri Historical Society and the United Way of greater St. Louis.

Orthwein's hobbies include horseback riding, hunting, fishing and oil painting. He rides and hunts frequently and is a member of the Missouri Horseman's Hall of Fame. Over the years, he has helped raise more than \$1 million for horse show related charities.

An avid sportsman, Orthwein is a hunter and skeet shooter and was Master of Foxhounds of the Bridlespur Hunt for 35 years. He remains an active member at a variety of clubs in the St. Louis area, including Bogey Club, Deer Creek Club, Old Warson Country Club and the Racquet Club. In addition, Orthwein is also an active member at the Clambake Club, the Newport Reading Room, the Newport Country Club and the Spouting Rock Beach Association in Newport, R.I., as well as

the Racquet and Tennis Club in New York.


He is considered a world class fisherman as well and currently holds three I.G.F.A. flyrod world records for bonefish (a 15-pounder on a four-pound tippet, a 13-pounder on a 16-pound tippet and a 12-pounder on a two-pound tippet). His world records were all caught off the coast of Bimini, in the Bahamas, on a fly he invented and ties himself. He once caught a black marlin weighing more than 1,000 pounds while deep sea fishing in Cairns, Australia.

Orthwein attended private schools in St. Louis prior to his studies at Choate Preparatory School in Wallingford, Conn. He then returned to St. Louis, where he enrolled at Washington University.

Orthwein was born March 13, 1924 in St. Louis, Mo. The father of four children, he lives in Huntleigh Village in St. Louis County.

## **MICHAEL J. O'HALLARON**

**Vice Chairman  
of the Board**



Michael J. O'Hallaron joined the Patriots on May 11, 1992 when partner James B. Orthwein purchased the franchise. O'Hallaron was appointed Vice Chairman of the Board and has worked closely with the organization since that time.

In 1984, O'Hallaron co-founded the Huntleigh Asset Partners, L.P. In addition to substantial public market investments, the Partners have a majority interest in five private businesses: Huntleigh Securities, Inc., a securities brokerage company; Huntleigh/Byrne Investment Advisors, an investment advisory firm; Huntleigh/McGehee Incorporated, a full line insurance brokerage company; Huntleigh Telecommunications Group, a telecommunications business located in El Paso, Texas; and Jameson Leasing, an automobile leasing company.

After earning his MBA degree from St. Louis University, O'Hallaron began his career in 1968 as a financial analyst for a major Trust company. Over the next several years, he held positions as a financial analyst and portfolio manager. In 1972, he became head of regional research for a New York Stock Exchange firm. In 1976, he was named the finance director for D'Arcy MacManus & Masius, a worldwide advertising firm. By the time O'Hallaron left the firm in 1983, he held the position of Senior Vice President - Finance and Administration.

Through a Partnership investment, O'Hallaron became President, Chief Operating Officer and member of the Board of a New York Stock Exchange company in 1986. The subsequent sale of that investment led to the purchase of Huntleigh Securities in 1988. O'Hallaron is a member of the Boards of Directors of each of the Partnership's private business investments. When not involved in operating issues at the Partnership businesses, his time is spent pursuing public market investing and trading.

O'Hallaron was born in St. Louis, Missouri on September 6, 1945. In his spare time, he enjoys playing golf and swimming. O'Hallaron and his family reside in the St. Louis suburb of Frontenac, Mo.

**PATRICK FORTE'****Executive  
Vice President  
Football Operations**


Patrick Forte', in his third season with the Patriots, was appointed Executive Vice President of Football Operations on January 21, 1993. In his new position, Forte' is responsible for all club administrative and football matters.

Forte', along with Executive Vice President James Hausmann, conduct all Patriots contract negotiations and report directly to Patriots Owner James B. Orthwein. In addition, Forte' lends his expertise in overseeing each of the football operations departments for the Patriots. These responsibilities include the supervising of all player personnel matters, field and facility operations, physician and trainer accountability, as well as the coordination of all equipment and video needs.

Forte' joined the Patriots organization on January 8, 1991 as Vice President of Administration. Prior to joining the Patriots, he was the Philadelphia Eagles' Assistant to the President, Chief Operating Officer and Chief Contract Negotiator from 1986-90.

The 43-year-old Forte' attended Lincoln University in Missouri. Forte' began his career in the field of public relations, working for General Motors and Honeywell corporations. He began his career in sports administration as an agent in 1980. After six years of negotiating contracts and endorsements for athletes, Forte' joined the Philadelphia Eagles to direct their contract negotiating efforts.

Patrick Forte' was born on March 17, 1950 in Flint, Mich. He and his wife, Christine, have two daughters, Brandi (4/28/81) and Jade (5/28/83) and reside in Weston, Mass.

**JAMES HAUSMANN****Executive  
Vice President  
Business Operations**

James R. Hausmann, in his second season with the Patriots, was appointed Executive Vice President of Business Operations on January 21, 1993.

In his current position, Hausmann is responsible for non-football business and provides financial guidance and support for all of the team's football-related activities, including contract negotiations.

He supervises the Patriots' off-field departments, including finance and accounting, data processing, marketing, ticket sales/operations, public relations, community relations, cheerleading, Patriots Club and merchandising activities. Hausmann, along with Coach Bill Parcells and Executive Vice President Patrick Forte', report directly to Chairman and President James B. Orthwein.


Hausmann joined the Patriots organization on May 17, 1992 as Vice President and Chief Financial Officer. Before joining the Patriots, Hausmann, a CPA, was an audit manager in public accounting at Deloitte and Touche in St. Louis, Mo. from 1990-92 and 1970-84 at DeloitteHaskins & Sells. During 1985-89, he worked as chief financial officer for a regional stock brokerage firm in St. Louis.

Hausmann is a member of the American Institute of CPA's and the Missouri Society of CPA's.

A 44-year-old native of Collinsville, Ill., Hausmann graduated from Southern Illinois University in 1970 with a B.S. in business administration and accounting. Jim and his wife, Terri, have three children, Jennifer (4/28/81), Kyle (6/3/84) and Brian (1/15/87).

**FRANCIS J. KILROY**

**Vice  
President**



Francis J. "Bucko" Kilroy is entering his 51st year in the National Football League. During that time, Kilroy has served in almost every conceivable capacity from player, to general manager to his current position of Vice President of the Patriots.

As one of the club's vice presidents, Kilroy serves as the team's liason with the league office to ensure the team is adhering to league guidelines and player personnel procedures.

After serving as Patriots general manager from 1979-83, Kilroy was promoted to the position of Vice President on February 16, 1983.

Born in Philadelphia, Kilroy began his NFL career with his hometown Philadelphia Eagles in 1943 and played there for 13 straight seasons. During that time, he once played in 146 consecutive games (league record at the time) and was selected as an all-pro as both offensive guard (1947-49) and middle guard (1952-54). He gained additional honors for his pro grid exploits as he was elected to the NFL's all-decade team for the 1940's and inducted into the Helms Hall of Fame and the Temple Hall of Fame.

He made a gradual entry into the coaching ranks by serving the Eagles for three seasons as a player/coach before assuming the full-time role of line coach for six more NFL campaigns. In addition to coaching, he also served as the club's player personnel director, making him one of the five original talent scouts in the league.

Kilroy was one of the founders — along with Phoenix Cardinals owner William V. Bidwell — of the National Football Scouting combine, now in its 12th year. There are 16 teams that participate in the scouting

service.

In 1962, Bucko was named Director of Player Personnel for the Washington Redskins and then moved to the Dallas Cowboys in 1965 to become a "super scout" with that organization. During Bucko's five-year tenure with the Cowboys, the team won five straight divisional championships.

Kilroy was named Player Personnel Director of the Patriots in 1971. He was appointed General Manager on April 6, 1979. In that capacity, he directed the Patriots' day-to-day business operations, was responsible for all contract negotiations and guided the implementation of a state-of-the-art computer system for the Patriots' operation.



## COACHING STAFF

**BILL PARCELLS****Head  
Coach**

Bill Parcells was named the New England Patriots' Head Coach on January 21, 1993. The charismatic coach returns to the sidelines after a 19-month sabbatical, during which time he spent two seasons working as an NBC football analyst. Health concerns forced Parcells from the sidelines following the 1990 New York Giants' championship season. With a full recovery from his heart bypass surgery, Parcells received the medical "green light" to resume his coaching career.

Since joining the Patriots, Parcells has been hard at work in preparation of rebuilding a championship team in New England. A solid foundation for the future was set in April with the addition of 10 draft choices, including the selection of QB Drew Bledsoe with the NFL draft's first overall selection.

Parcells, who currently ranks seventh in victories (77) among active coaches, orchestrated one of the most successful turnabouts in NFL history during his eight-year (1983-90) tenure as the head coach of the New York Giants. Parcells took over the Giants' reins in December of 1982, upon the resignation of head coach Ray Perkins.

Parcells inherited a team that was coming off losing records in nine of the previous 10 seasons and had been to the playoffs just once in 20 years. The following season, the Giants began their metamorphosis. From 1984 to 1990, New York accumulated six winning seasons, including five trips to the playoffs and two Super Bowl Championships. During his eight seasons, Parcells tallied an 85-52-1 career record (.620 winning percentage), which currently ranks Parcells as the second winningest coach in Giants history, behind Steve Owen (151-100-17), the legendary Hall of Famer.

In Parcells' first season (1983) as the head coach, the club was besieged by injuries, as 25 players spent a portion of their season on the injured reserve list. The team also had the double misfortune of leading the NFL in turnovers (58). But, the hurdles the first-year head coach had to overcome on the field were minute in comparison to those he had to endure off the field. The tragic chain of events began in October of 1983 when Parcells lost his backfield coach and friend, Bob Ledbetter, who died of a sudden stroke. That was then followed by the passing of former Giants running back Doug Kotar and the deaths of both of Parcells' parents within six weeks of each other late in the season. On the field, the '83 squad finished with a 3-12-1 record and last in the division. There has probably been no tougher year for a rookie head coach to endure than that season. But, Parcells overcame that tumultuous year and began working diligently to rebuild the franchise.

In 1984, Parcells hired strength and conditioning coach Johnny Parker, who initiated a conditioning program that helped reduce the number of players on injured reserve from 25 to seven. That season, the Giants finished second in the NFC East with a 9-7 record and qualified for a wild card playoff berth. Parcells notched his first playoff victory in

his first attempt, with a 16-13 decision over the Los Angeles Rams. The following week, the Giants lost a hard-fought game to the eventual Super Bowl champion San Francisco 49ers, 21-10. In recognition of his accomplishments, Parcells earned NFC East Coach of the Year honors by *Pro Magazine* and finished second in two major NFL Coach of the Year polls; one to the 49ers' Bill Walsh and the other to Seattle's Chuck Knox.

In 1985, New York finished 10-6 and returned to the playoffs. In the first round, they avenged their 1984 playoff loss with a 17-3 victory over the defending champion San Francisco 49ers. The following week, the Giants were again ousted from the playoffs by the eventual Super Bowl champion, the Chicago Bears. The back-to-back playoff appearances was a task that no other Giants coach had accomplished in over 20 years.

In 1986, Parcells' Giants recorded their greatest single season record ever with a 17-2 mark. They also set a club mark by winning 12 consecutive games, which culminated with a 39-20 win over the Denver Broncos in Super Bowl XXI. In three playoff games, the Giants set an NFL record for cumulative margin of victory with a 102-23 advantage. Parcells was named NFL Coach of the Year in every major poll in the country, a fitting tribute for the spectacular season that Parcells had masterminded.

In 1989, Parcells again earned NFL Coach of the Year honors from NFL Films and NFC Coach of the Year honors from the *Washington Post* for his 12-4 first-place finish. The following season, Parcells led New York's triumphant return to the Super Bowl, winning a dramatic 20-19 decision over the Buffalo Bills. Following the 1990 championship season, Parcells learned of a threatening heart condition and on May 15, 1991 Parcells resigned.

The Oradell, N.J. native was a member of the first graduating class at River Dell High in 1959. Parcells was a three-sport letterman, starring in basketball, football and baseball. He captained and earned all-league honors in each of the respective sports. The tri-sport captain saw double-duty in football, as a quarterback and linebacker, and in baseball as a pitcher and catcher.

He attended Colgate in 1960, then transferred to Wichita State (1961-63), where he excelled as a linebacker. In a game against Tulsa, Parcells ravished the Golden Hurricane backfield, compiling 20 tackles and six sacks. He earned All-Missouri Valley Conference honors as a senior and played in the 1963 Blue-Gray and 1964 College All-Star Games. Opting for a coaching career rather than playing professionally, he joined the staff at Hastings College (Neb.) in 1964 as a defensive assistant. He returned to his alma mater in 1965 to coach the defensive line, before joining Tom Cahill's staff at West Point as linebacker coach in 1966. After coaching Army's Black Knights for four seasons (1966-69), he directed the linebackers at Florida State for three years (1970-72). He then went on to serve as defensive coordinator at both Vanderbilt (1973-74) and Texas Tech (1975-77). He received his first head coaching assignment at the Air Force Academy in 1978, where he piloted the Falcons to a 3-8 record.

Parcells left the collegiate circuit in 1979 to accept an assistant position on Ray Perkins' staff with the New York Giants. Personal matters forced Parcells to resign from the Giants prior to the season. In 1980, he resumed his coaching career as the New England Patriots' linebackers coach on Ron Erhardt's staff. The following season, Parcells left New England to return to the New York Giants as Perkins' defensive coordinator and linebackers coach. His presence created an instant improvement. Prior to Parcells' arrival, the Giants had allowed 425 points to the opposition. In 1981, Parcells installed the 3-4 defense,

revamped the secondary and produced a defensive unit which finished the year ranked third in the league. New York posted a 9-7 record, the first winning season recorded in eight years, and qualified for the playoffs for the first time since 1963.

He was born Duane Charles (Bill) Parcells on August 22, 1941, in Englewood, N.J. Bill and his wife, Judith, have three daughters; Suzy, Jill and Dallas, and one grandson; Kyle.




**DAVID ATKINS****Running  
Backs**

**COACHING:** Atkins, now in his eighth NFL season, was named running backs coach on January 25, 1993. Atkins will focus his efforts on the development of running backs Jon Vaughn and Leonard Russell in his first season with the Patriots. In seven seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles, Atkins was given three areas of concentration, running backs, special teams and tight ends. Last season, he drew the assignment of coaching the tight ends, an area depleted by the departure of all-pro incumbent Keith Jackson. To fill the void, Atkins worked diligently with Keith Byars to prepare the long-time running back for the transition to tight end. In 1991, Atkins directed Philadelphia's special teams units after five seasons of tutoring the Eagles' running backs. In his first year as an NFL assistant, Atkins helped resurrect the Eagles' ground game. Prior to his arrival, Philadelphia's rushing attack finished 23rd in the league. In 1986, the Eagles gained 2,002 yards, producing their highest total since the 1981 season, and soared to an eighth-place ranking. By 1990, the Eagles were averaging 159.8 yards per game, tops in the NFL. Atkins entered the coaching ranks as an assistant at Burges High School in El Paso (1977-78). He joined the college ranks in 1979 as an assistant at his alma mater (Texas-El Paso) where he coached the running backs and kicking game for two years. In 1981, he began a five year coaching stint at San Diego State prior to joining the Philadelphia Eagles.

**PLAYING:** The San Francisco 49ers selected the Texas-El Paso grad in the eighth round of the 1973 NFL draft. Atkins saw limited action that season as a running back and kick returner. In 1974, he left the 49ers and signed with the Honolulu Hawaiians of the World Football League. Atkins completed his three-year playing career with the San Diego Chargers in 1975. As a running back at Texas-El Paso from 1970-72, he served as tri-captain in his senior year when he rushed for 350 yards (4.9-yard average). He completed his collegiate career with 793 yards rushing and six touchdowns.

**PERSONAL:** David Charles Atkins was born in Victoria, Texas on May 18, 1949. At Victoria High, he earned two varsity letters as a fullback in football and one as a high hurdler in track. Atkins and his wife, Cynthia, have two children, Dave Jr. (16) and Jasmine (2).




**ROMEO CRENNEL****Defensive  
Line**

**COACHING:** Crennel, in his 13th NFL season, became reunited with his long-time coaching associate when Bill Parcells added the veteran assistant to his staff on January 25, 1993. Crennel will resume his duties instructing the defensive line, a position he has coached with the New York Giants since 1990. During his 12-year (1981-92) Giants tenure, he coached on six playoff teams, three NFC East championship teams and two Super Bowl championship squads. Crennel entered the professional ranks in 1981, along with Parcells, as an assistant on Ray Perkins' staff in New York. His coaching contributions helped lead the Giants to their first winning season in nine years and the first playoff berth since 1963. He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Western Kentucky in 1970 and continued as a full-time assistant from 1971-74. He then moved on to Texas Tech as an assistant to Tech's defensive coordinator, Bill Parcells, from 1975-77. In 1978, Crennel was named the defensive end coach at Ole Miss. He remained at Mississippi for two seasons before being named the defensive line coach at Georgia Tech in 1980. The following season, Crennel left the collegiate ranks and was re-united with Parcells as an assistant with the Giants.

**PLAYING:** A four-year letterman at Western Kentucky, Crennel starred as a defensive lineman. As captain of the team, he earned All-Conference and MVP honors in 1969.

**PERSONAL:** Romeo Crennel, a Lynchburg, Va. native, was born June 18, 1947. Crennel was a high school standout at both Fort Knox (Ky.) High and at Central (Amherst, Va.) High. Crennel earned his bachelor's degree in physical education at Western Kentucky and received his master's degree in education while serving as a graduate assistant in 1970. His brother, Carl, was a former starting linebacker with Hamilton in the Canadian Football League. Romeo and his wife, Rosemary, have three daughters, Lisa (24), Tiffany (21), and Kristin (16).

**AL GROH****Defensive Coordinator/  
Linebackers**

**COACHING:** Groh, now in his sixth NFL season, was named defensive coordinator on January 25, 1993, a position he held for the New York


Giants in 1991. In addition, he will be responsible for coaching the Patriots' linebacking corps. During his 28-year sideline tenure, Groh has coached at nearly every level of competition and instructed positions on both sides of the ball. His gridiron successes have taken him from his high school coaching days, through the collegiate ranks, to the professional level. During that time, Groh has served as a head coach, defensive coordinator, offensive coordinator and special teams coach. Last season, Groh served as the linebackers coach for the Cleveland Browns under Bill Belichick. Prior to his one-year stint with the Browns, he served three seasons with the New York Giants, joining Bill Parcells' staff in 1989 and contributing to a 12-5 divisional championship season. The following year, the Giants again claimed the NFC East divisional crown on their way to becoming Super Bowl champions. The highly experienced Groh began his coaching career in 1966 at Albemarle (Charlottesville, Va.) High. His initial assignment with Parcells came when Groh entered the collegiate ranks at West Point (1968-69) where he served on Tom Cahill's staff. He left Army in 1970 for an opportunity to coach at his alma mater. He remained at Virginia for three seasons (1970-72) as a defensive assistant. At North Carolina (1973-77), Groh helped recruit Giants LB Lawrence Taylor. He left North Carolina in 1978 to become Parcells' defensive coordinator at the Air Force Academy, followed by a season at Texas Tech in 1980. Groh was named the head coach at Wake Forest 1981 and became the second winningest coach in Deacon history during his six-year tenure (1981-86). He first joined the NFL elite in 1987 as an assistant with the Atlanta Falcons, but returned to the collegiate level the following season (1988) as the offensive coordinator at South Carolina.

**PLAYING:** Groh was a four-year letterman at the University of Virginia and played three seasons as an outside linebacker.

**PERSONAL:** Al Groh was born July 13, 1944 in New York City. He starred as a scholastic athlete at Chaminade High in Mineola, N.Y. and, while at Virginia, he also lettered as a defense man in lacrosse. He earned his bachelor's degree in commerce at the University of Virginia in 1967. Al and his wife, Anne, have three children, Michael (21), who is a quarterback at Virginia; Ashley Anne (19), who attends Bowling Green, and Matthew (13).

## FRED HOAGLIN

Offensive  
Line



**COACHING:** Hoaglin, in his 16th NFL season, was named offensive line coach on January 25, 1993. The former NFL all-pro center served the last eight seasons (1985-92) coaching the offensive linemen for the New York Giants. Six of those years (1985-90) were spent as an assistant on Bill Parcells' staff, which won two Super Bowls and qualified for the playoffs four of the six seasons. Prior to joining the Giants, Hoaglin handled the offensive line chores for the Detroit Lions for seven seasons (1978-84). During that time, the industrial engineer

major assembled a powerful offensive line which paved the way for Detroit backs to lead the NFL in rushing in 1981.

**PLAYING:** The Cleveland Browns selected the University of Pittsburgh grad in the sixth round of the 1966 NFL draft. Shortly thereafter, Hoaglin began a string of 69 consecutive starts for the Browns. The versatile lineman was capable of playing any position on the offensive line, but spent the majority of his 11-year career at the center position. Hoaglin's peers elected him to the Pro Bowl as a center in 1969. He was traded to Baltimore in 1973 and spent the following two seasons in Houston (1974-75) before ending his career with the 1976 expansion Seattle Seahawks. Hoaglin was a starter as both a center and linebacker at the University of Pittsburgh and was selected to play in the North-South All-Star game his senior year.

**PERSONAL:** Fred Hoaglin was born January 28, 1944, in Alliance, Ohio. In addition to his gridiron success, he also earned two varsity letters in golf while at Pitt and still considers it his favorite hobby. Hoaglinearned his bachelor's degree in industrial engineering in 1968. Fred and his wife, Janet, have two children, Patricia Compton (25) and George (22), and two grandchildren, Andrew (6) and Kristina Compton (4).

## CHRIS PALMER

### Wide Receivers



**COACHING:** Palmer, now in his fourth NFL season, was named wide receivers coach on January 27, 1993. Palmer joins the Patriots after three seasons as the receivers coach for the Houston Oilers. In 1992, Palmer tutored a triumvirate of Pro Bowl receivers, including Curtis Duncan, Ernest Givins and Haywood Jeffires. Houston ranked first in the league in passing in each of Palmer's three seasons with the Oilers, averaging over 251 yards per game last season. His move to the Patriots marks his return to the Northeast, where many Boston natives will remember Palmer as the head coach at Boston University. Palmer installed the "Run 'N Shoot" offense during his two seasons at BU and produced one of the areas most exciting collegiate programs. He led the Terriers to a pair of 4-7 seasons, but his 1989 squad lost five games by a total of 15 points. The offense finished 10th nationally by passing for an average of 284.6 yards per game. Before joining BU, Palmer served as the head coach at the University of New Haven from 1986-87. During his tenure with the Chargers, they posted consecutive 8-2 records. In 1987, the team set records for consecutive wins (eight) and points in a season. In 1986, UNH finished second in the nation in passing offense and broke 54 school records. Palmer spent two seasons in the USFL, beginning as the receivers coach for New Jersey in 1984 and returning as the Generals' offensive coordinator in 1985. The Generals, led by RB Hershel Walker and QB Doug Flutie, posted records of 14-4 and 11-7, respectively, and qualified for the playoffs each season. In 1985, Palmer's offensive unit led the league in rushing. He began his coaching career as a collegiate assistant at the University of Connecticut (1972-


74). His initial position assignment was to coach the defensive line. His first offensive assignment came in 1975 as the wide receivers coach at Lehigh. The following season, Palmer was named the offensive coordinator at Colgate, where he remained for seven years (1976-82). In 1977, the Red Raiders led the nation in offense with a per-game average of 486 total yards.

**PLAYING:** Palmer played quarterback for the South Connecticut State Owls from 1968-71.

**PERSONAL:** Chris Palmer was born September 23, 1949, in Brewster, N.Y. He earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees from Southern Connecticut State. Chris and his wife, Donna, have two children, Mark (16) and Kristin (13).


## JOHNNY PARKER

Strength and  
Conditioning



**COACHING:** Parker, now in his 10th NFL season, was named the strength and conditioning coach on January 25, 1993. He has made an immediate impact since joining the Patriots by orchestrating an unparalleled off-season conditioning program, which has involved over 40 players regularly since the program's inception. His ability to motivate players to participate in a year-round training program has been the key to his success over the years. Prior to joining the Patriots, Parker maintained a similar post for nine seasons (1984-92) with the New York Giants. Coach Parcells saw an immediate return on his investment when he added Parker to his staff in 1984. The previous season, the Giants had been decimated by injuries, as 25 players spent time on the injured reserve list. In 1984, that number was cut to seven. Parker began his coaching career as linebackers coach for Indianola Academy followed by a three-year stint (1974-76) at South Carolina as the squad's strength and conditioning coach. The following three years (1977-79) were spent at Indiana in a similar capacity. In 1980, Parker assisted at Louisiana State, followed by four seasons (1981-83) at Mississippi, prior to joining Parcells and the New York Giants in 1984.

**PERSONAL:** Johnny Parker was born February 1, 1947, in Greenville, S.C., and raised in Shaw, Miss. He graduated from Shaw High School, then matriculated to Ole Miss, where he earned his bachelor's degree in 1968. Parker continued his education with a master's degree from Delta State University. Parker visited the Soviet Union in 1983 and again in 1986 to study the methods of the Russian Olympic trainers and has incorporated a number of their techniques into his strength and conditioning practices. Johnny and his wife, Jane, currently reside in Foxboro, Mass.

**RAY PERKINS****Offensive  
Coordinator**

**COACHING:** Perkins, now in his 15th NFL season, was named offensive coordinator on January 25, 1993. In the last 20 years, Perkins' coaching career has come full circle, as the veteran coach returns to the team that gave him his first NFL assignment in 1974. Since then, Perkins has coached on both the NFL and collegiate levels and has gained 14 years of head coaching experience along the way. Perkins entered the coaching ranks on his first assignment (1973) as receivers coach at Mississippi State. He joined Chuck Fairbanks' staff as receivers coach for the Patriots in 1974. After four seasons (1974-77) at New England, Perkins coached one season at San Diego (1978) before being named head coach of the New York Giants in 1979. In 1981, Perkins assembled a staff in New York that included Bill Parcells (defensive coordinator) and Romeo Crennel (special teams) as assistants and led the Giants to their first winning season in nine years. In 1983, Perkins left the Big Apple to return to his alma mater as the successor to Paul "Bear" Bryant at the University of Alabama. In four seasons (1983-86), he led the Crimson Tide to three bowl appearances and accumulated a 32-15-1 record. He returned to the NFL in 1987, where he served as the head coach for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers for four years (1987-90). Last season, Perkins returned to coaching after a year's absence to head the Arkansas State staff.


**PLAYING:** Perkins was selected by the Baltimore Colts in the seventh round of the 1967 NFL draft. The sure-handed receiver played six seasons (1967-72) with the Colts, corraling 93 passes for 1,538 yards and 11 TDs. A knee injury forced Perkins' early retirement in 1972. He was a member of two Super Bowl teams, including the 1971 Super Bowl championship team. Perkins was recruited to Alabama by the late Bear Bryant in 1962. A head injury in spring drills led to brain surgery and his position transformation from fullback to wide receiver. After redshirting in 1963, Perkins completed one of the finest receiving careers in Crimson Tide history. His 63 receptions for 908 yards and nine touchdowns were hailed from three All-American quarterbacks; Joe Namath (1964), Steve Sloan (1965) and Kenny Stabler (1966). Alabama rolled up a 30-2-1 record during Perkins' career (1964-66), including national championships in 1964 and 1965. Perkins co-captained the 1966 squad while earning consensus All-America acclaim and SEC Player of the Year honors.

**PERSONAL:** Walter Ray Perkins was born November 6, 1941, in Mt. Olive, Miss. Blessed with tremendous athletic ability, he was an outstanding prep athlete in football, basketball, baseball and track. He was an All-American fullback at Petal (Miss.) High and in his only season playing basketball, he earned All-State recognition. While at Alabama, Perkins also competed in track as a member of the Crimson Tide's relay team and as a sprinter. He was inducted into the Alabama

Hall of Fame in 1990. Ray is the father of two sons, Tony (29), a graphic arts designer in Tuscaloosa, Ala. and Mike (25), the video coordinator for athletics at Syracuse University.

Assistant




**COACHING:** Scarnecchia, now in his 12th season in the NFL and 10th with the Patriots, was named to Bill Parcells' staff as a special assistant on January 27, 1993. Scarnecchia was the only Patriot assistant retained from the 1992 coaching staff. Last season, he was called upon to handle the head coaching duties as the Patriots' spokesperson for seven games when Coach Dick MacPherson fell ill and was hospitalized in mid-season. Scarnecchia re-joined the Patriots in 1991 after spending two seasons (1989-90) as the Indianapolis Colts' offensive line coach. He was the Patriots' special teams/tight ends coach from 1982-88. He began his coaching career as the offensive line coach at California Western University in 1970. He moved to Iowa State in 1973, where he served as the offensive line and defensive backfield coach under Earle Bruce. He spent the 1975 and 1976 campaigns at Southern Methodist University, before becoming Pacific University's offensive line coach and recruiting coordinator in 1977. After spending one season (1979) at Northern Arizona, he returned to SMU in 1980 as offensive line coach. He remained there until moving to the Patriots in 1982.

**PLAYING:** Scarnecchia played offensive guard and center at California Western University (now U.S. International) from 1968-70. Scarnecchia began his collegiate career at Taft Junior College in 1966 before transferring to California Western.

**PERSONAL:** Dante Scarnecchia was born February 15, 1948, in Los Angeles, Calif. Scarnecchia holds a master's degree in physical education from U.S. International. Dante and his wife, Susan, have a son, Steve (15) and a daughter, Lisa (12).

## MIKE SWEATMAN

Special  
Teams



**COACHING:** Sweatman, now in his 10th NFL season, was named as the special teams coach on January 25, 1993. He spent the previous eight


seasons (1985-92) with the New York Giants, including six seasons assisting his current mentor, Bill Parcells. Sweatman began his coaching career in 1968 as a graduate assistant at Kansas. In 1970, he led the Okinawa Devil Dogs to a 10-1 record. Sweatman spent the 1971 and 1972 seasons at the Quantico Marine Base in Virginia, where he coached the Quantico Marines football team. He resumed his collegiate coaching career when he returned to Kansas in 1973. He left Kansas in 1975 to take an assignment at Coffeyville Junior College. In 1977, he returned to Division I competition with a two-year stint at Tulsa. The Kansas alumnus returned to his alma mater once again in 1979. After four seasons (1979-82), Sweatman left the Jayhawks to accept a similar position with Tennessee in 1983. He entered the professional ranks the following season with the Minnesota Vikings, prior to joining Parcells in New York in 1985.

**PLAYING:** Sweatman starred at Kansas as a two-time All-Big Eight linebacker. Voted as team captain his senior season (1967), Sweatman earned academic All-American acclaim and was also selected to participate in the East-West Shrine and Hula Bowl all-star games. While stationed at the Quantico Marine Base in 1969, Sweatman played linebacker for the Marines prior to being sent overseas.

**PERSONAL:** Michael Sweatman was born in Kansas City, Mo. While at the University of Kansas, Sweatman earned a varsity letter in wrestling and was a co-captain of that team in 1966. He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education and later returned to Kansas for his master's degree. He served four years in the U.S. Marine Corps as an infantry officer, including service in Vietnam. He remains a member of the Marine Corps Reserve and presently hold the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. Mike and his wife, Teri, have three sons, Tom (18), Chris (15) and Dan (12).

### Defensive Backs



**COACHING:** Trott, now in his third NFL season, was named defensive backs coach on January 27, 1993. Like many of the Patriots' new assistant coaches, Trott joins Parcells' staff via the New York Giants. Trott entered the professional coaching ranks with the Giants in May of 1991 as a defensive assistant on Ray Handley's staff. Prior to that, Trott gained 15 years of collegiate experience beginning at North Carolina in 1976. After two seasons as an assistant for the Tarheels, he moved on to Air Force, joining Parcells' staff as a linebackers coach in 1978. He continued at the Academy through the 1983 campaign, coaching the linebackers from 1978-80 and the defensive backs from 1981-83. Trott left the Academy to assume the defensive backfield duties for Arkansas in 1984. After five seasons with the Razorbacks, Trott was named defensive coordinator. He left Arkansas in 1990 to become the defensive coordinator for the Clemson Tigers. That season, the Tigers led the nation in total defense by allowing a mere 217 yards per game. It was

the first time that Clemson had ever earned that distinction. In addition, Clemson led the Atlantic Coast Conference in nine defensive categories and finished second in the NCAA national rankings for rushing and scoring defense. The following season, Trott joined the professional ranks with the defending champion New York Giants. During his collegiate playing and coaching career, Trott appeared in 12 post season bowl games.

**PLAYING:** Trott earned three varsity letters as a defensive back at the University of North Carolina and graduated in 1976 with a degree in business. The scholar-athlete received All-Academic recognition his senior season.

**PERSONAL:** Robert Trott was born March 19, 1954, in Concord, N.C. and raised in Kannapolis, N.C. He starred as a prep athlete and earned All-Conference recognition as a wide receiver and defensive back at A.L. Brown (Kannapolis, N.C.) High. In addition, he earned varsity letters in wrestling and track. Trott received his master's degree in education at the University of North Carolina. Bob and his wife, Barbara, have three children, Amanda (9/9/81), Nathan (2/23/84) and Brittany (1/14/88).

## CHARLIE WEIS

**COACHING:** Weis, now in his fourth NFL season, was named the tight end coach on January 25, 1993. Weis' previous NFL experience came during a three-year assignment with the New York Giants, including one season under the direction of Bill Parcells. Upon the completion of his undergraduate studies, Weis began a coaching and teaching career at Boonton H.S. in New Jersey in 1979, coaching football, basketball and baseball while also teaching English. In 1980, he moved to Morristown H.S., where he assumed similar responsibilities. Weis moved up to the collegiate ranks in 1985 when he joined the late Joe Morrison's staff at South Carolina for four seasons. Upon the passing of Morrison, Weis returned to New Jersey to become the head coach at Franklin Township High in 1989, winning a state championship in the process. - Nov. 16 American Football League's eighth and final franchise is awarded to William H. Sullivan, Jr.  
 Nov. 22 Northwestern RB Ron Burton is selected as first draft choice and Syracuse RB Gerhardt Schwedes is made first territorial choice.

### 1960

- Feb. 8 Lou Saban is appointed first head coach.  
 Feb. 20 As the result of a public contest, the team nickname of Patriots is chosen. The Patriots also announce that the team colors will be red, white and blue.  
 April 1 Boston University Field is named as the Patriots' first home.  
 April 2 Patriots become first pro team in history to issue public stock.  
 April 19 Uniformed Patriot centering football (creative work of Boston—Worcester cartoonist Phil Bissell) is adopted as team logo.  
 July 4 Team opens first training camp at UMass, 350 players attend.  
 July 30 In the AFL's first ever preseason game, Patriots defeat Buffalo 28-7 at War Memorial Stadium. Patriots DE Bob Dee recovered fumble for the league's first TD.  
 Aug. 14 Patriots play their first home game ever at Harvard Stadium, a 24-14 loss to the Dallas Texans before 11,000 fans.  
 Sept. 9 In their first regular season game, the Patriots open with a 13-10 loss to Denver at B.U. Field before a crowd of 21,597.  
 Sept. 16 DB Chuck Shonta recovered a fumble on the final play of the game and ran for a TD to give the Patriots their first win ever by a 28-24 margin over the N.Y. Titans at the Polo Grounds in New York.

- Oct. 11 Patriots play their first game in Fenway Park and beat Oakland 20-14.  
 Dec. 28 With a 26-8 victory over Buffalo, the Patriots win the AFL's Eastern Division title in the league's only playoff game ever held.

### 1964

- Jan. 5 Lost AFL title game, 51-10, to the Chargers at San Diego.

### 1970

- April 4 Foxboro selected as new site of Patriots' home.

### 1971

- Mar. 22 Team is renamed New England Patriots.  
 Aug. 15 Sullivan Stadium, at the time known as Schaefer Stadium, is dedicated with Patriots first game there. Gino Cappelletti kicked a 36-yard FG for the first points scored in the stadium as the Patriots topped the NY Giants, 20-14, before 60,423 fans.

### 1972

- Feb. 17 Made financial history by paying first cash dividend of 15 cents per share.

### 1973

- Jan. 26 Chuck Fairbanks is named head coach and general manager.

### 1975

- Nov. 7 President William H. Sullivan, Jr. became the first majority owner in club history when he purchased additional voting stock to give him 88 per cent of the franchise's voting stock.

### 1976

- July 10 Patriots open their training camp for the first time at Bryant College in Smithfield, RI after spending the summers of 1969-75 at UMass/Amherst.  
 Dec. 8 Non-voting stockholders approve offer of \$15 per share made by Billy Sullivan to purchase all non-voting stock.  
 Dec. 18 Lost AFC wild card playoff game to the eventual Super Bowl Champion Oakland Raiders, 24-21, in the final ten seconds of play.

### 1977

- Aug. 20 Work completed on installation of new surface (Super Turf) in Sullivan Stadium.

### 1978

- Sept. 3 Mrs. William H. (Mary M.) Sullivan, Jr. elected to the Patriots Board of Directors.  
 Dec. 10 Patriots clinch their first outright divisional championship in the club's history with a last minute 26-24 victory over Buffalo at Foxboro.  
 Dec. 31 Patriots lose 31-14 to Houston in first playoff game ever played in Foxboro.

**1979**

- April 2 Patriots announce that Head Coach and General Manager Chuck Fairbanks has been released from his contract to assume duties as Head Football Coach at the University of Colorado.
- April 6 Francis "Bucko" Kilroy named as the new general manager and former Patriots' offensive coordinator Ron "Fargo" Erhardt named as head coach.
- July 13 Patriots' Vice President Charles W. "Chuck" Sullivan is promoted to Executive Vice President of the club.
- Sept. 3 Former Patriots' wide receiver Darryl Stingley is named Executive Director of Player Personnel.
- Oct. 23 Jeanne Sullivan McKeigue is elected as member of the club's Board of Directors.
- Dec. 16 Patriots close out 1979 regular season with 27-23 victory over Minnesota. Harold Jackson (1,013) and Stanley Morgan (1,002) become first Patriot players ever to transcend 1,000-yard season receiving mark.

**1980**

- Feb. 25 Paul Sonnabend resigns as Executive Director of the NFL Management Council and is appointed as Vice President and a member of the Board of Directors of the Patriots.
- April 8 William H. "Billy" Sullivan, Jr., President of the Patriots, is re-elected as Chairman of the Board of NFL Properties.

**1981**

- Nov. 29 FB Sam Cunningham, with 35 yards on nine carries against St. Louis at Foxboro, surpasses Jim Nance (5,323 yards on 1,323 carries) as the Patriots' all-time career rushing leader.

**1982**

- Jan. 15 Ron Meyer, Head Coach at SMU from 1976-81, is named the eighth Head Coach in club history. 1983

**1983**

- Jan. 8 In their first playoff appearance since 1978, the Patriots lose to the eventual AFC Champion Miami Dolphins at the Orange Bowl, 28-13.
- Feb. 16 General Manager Bucko Kilroy is promoted to the position of Vice President and Patrick Sullivan, Assistant General Manager for four years, is named General Manager.
- May 17 William F. Finucane and Jeannette Allen Keefe are elected to the Patriots' Board of Directors.
- May 23 Schaefer Stadium is renamed Sullivan Stadium in honor of the founder and driving force behind the Patriots franchise, William H. "Billy" Sullivan, Jr.
- June 29 Sullivan Stadium is officially re-dedicated and the Boston Pops performs a concert in the stadium that is open free-of-charge to the public.

**1984**

- June 1 The Patriots organize a Fan Advisory Board, a group of season ticket holders who will help advise the Patriots on how to make Sullivan Stadium a more exciting and more pleasant place to bring a family to watch an NFL game.
- June 5 In the first-ever NFL Supplemental Draft, the Patriots selected slotback Ricky Sanders of the Houston Gamblers, running back Eric Jordan of the Oakland Invaders and quarterback Walter Lewis of the Memphis Showboats.
- Aug. 10 Work on a new turf, SuperTurf, is completed on the field. It is the second time that surface has been used at Sullivan Stadium. The original SuperTurf was installed in 1977.
- Oct. 25 Hall of Fame pass receiver Raymond Berry is named the head coach of the Patriots, replacing Ron Meyer. Berry, a former Patriots assistant coach, becomes the team's ninth head coach.

**1985**

- July 26 Patrick J. Sullivan, William H. Sullivan III and Mrs. Nancie Chamberlain are elected to the Patriots' Board of Directors.
- Oct. 13 Raymond Clayborn establishes a new team record for consecutive starts by starting his 111 straight game. Ray Hamilton had the old mark of 110, done from September 16, 1973 to October 26, 1980. (Clayborn's streak started on September 3, 1978. He ended the season with 121). Clayborn celebrated the record-setting day by scoring his first pro interception touchdown (27 yards).
- Dec. 28 The Patriots defeated the New York Jets, 26-14, at Giants Stadium (East Rutherford, N.J.) in the AFC Wildcard game. With the victory the Patriots win their first NFL playoff game (The Patriots had an 0-3 NFL playoff record prior to the game).

**1986**

- Jan. 12 The Patriots beat the Miami Dolphins, 31-14, thus winning the AFC Championship. In doing so, the Patriots ended an 18-game losing streak at the Orange Bowl. It was also only the second time the Patriots won at the Orange Bowl (1966 was the other time).
- Jan. 26 The Patriots play in Super Bowl XX, going against the Chicago Bears in the Louisiana Superdome in New Orleans. The Bears win the game, 46-10. The game, shown on NBC-TV, was the third-rated Super Bowl with a 48.3 rating and a 70 share (one rating point represents 859,000 TV households; a share is the percentage of sets in use). Only the 1982 and 1983 Super Bowls had higher ratings. It was the most widely-watched TV show ever—with 127 million viewers (topping the previous high of 121,600,000 who watched the final MASH show of February 28, 1983). The previous high Super Bowl in terms of viewers was Super Bowl XIX between the 49ers and the Dolphins (115,880,000). Also, 300 million people in China watched the game on tape delay.
- Jan. 27 Defensive end Julius Adams retires after 15 years (all with the Patriots). Adams, the team's number two draft choice in 1971 out of Texas Southern, was the oldest active defensive lineman in the league at age 37 when he retired. He started the final 12 games of the regular season, and all four post-season games in 1985. He has the club record for games played with 196 (John Hannah follows with 186).
- June 30 John Hannah, who was selected to the Pro Bowl a team record nine times (next nearest on team, six), announces his retirement from the game. Second in the team's record book for games-played with 183 (Julius Adams has lead with 196), the standout offensive guard had been selected to the All-NFL 25-year team (from 1960-84).
- June 12 Coach Raymond Berry, who led the Patriots to the AFC Championship and Super Bowl XX in his first full season as the team's head coach, signs new five-year contract.
- Sept. 7 1985 AFC Championship banner raised at Sullivan Stadium in pre-game ceremony (prior to opening game vs. Indianapolis Colts). The banner is 10 feet wide and 15 feet long. Mr. William H. Sullivan, Jr. is joined by the governors from each of the New England states.
- Sept. 21 QB Tony Eason throws for team record 414 yards (400 previous record, done by Vito "Babe Parilli in 1964). The Patriots lost to Seattle, 38-31, in the game played in Foxboro. Eason was 26 of 45 with three TDs and no interceptions.
- Dec. 7 WR Stanley Morgan establishes a new team record for catches in one season with his 67th catch of the season (had five catches in the day). Morgan, who finished the season with 84 catches, broke Derrick Ramsey's previous mark of 66 catches, done in 1984.
- Dec. 31 NEP Partners purchase a three-year option to buy the Patriots.

**1987**

- Sept. 13 Patriots become first NFL team to have its games on a French-speaking radio network on a regular basis. CKLM—a 50,000-watt station out of Laval, Quebec, Canada—was the flagship station (others were CJSA in Ste. Agathe, Que.; CKSL in St. Jovite, Que., and CJER in St. Jerome, Que.). Pierre Donais was the announcer.
- Sept. 13 Patriots begin four-year, five-million dollar contract with WHDH-Boston.
- Nov. 29 Cornerback Raymond Clayborn ends his streak of having played in 161 straight contests—and started in 147 consecutive games—when he couldn't play vs. Philadelphia at Sullivan Stadium due to knee injury suffered week before vs. Indianapolis Colts on November 22nd. Clay-born, who went on IR on November 24th (spent rest of season on list), broke Gino Cappelletti's record of 152 consecutive games-played and Ray Hamilton's 110 consecutive starts.

**1988**

- July 11 The Patriots retire the number 57 worn by 14-year linebacker Steve Nelson, who retired following the 1987 season. Nelson played in three Pro Bowls and led the team in tackles eight years.
- July 28 Victor K. Kiam II, the owner and chief executive officer (CEO) of Remington Products, Inc. of Bridgeport, Ct., agrees to purchase the team from William H. Sullivan, Jr.
- Oct. 28 Victor K. Kiam II becomes majority owner of the Patriots. He will be chairman of the team. Francis W. Murray, the minority owner, is the vice chairman. William H. Sullivan, Jr., the founder and previous owner, remains as the team's president. The Kiam, Murray and Sullivan team is known as KMS Limited.
- Dec. 4 Veteran wide receiver Stanley Morgan catches his 500th career pass, on a 19-yarder (26 seconds remaining in the first quarter) vs. Seattle.

**1989**

- Jan. 6 Running back John Stephens named the Old Spice/NFL Rookie of the Year.

## 1990

- Feb. 27 Rod Rust is named the head coach of the Patriots, replacing Raymond Berry (who was relieved of his duties on Feb. 26). Rust, a former Patriots' defensive coordinator, becomes the team's tenth head coach.
- Mar. 14 Former Patriots offensive guard John Hannah and cornerback Mike Haynes are selected to the National Football League's All-1980's team, while current linebacker Andre Tippett named to second-team.
- Dec. 20 Sam Jankovich, the University of Miami's Athletic Director from 1982-90, is named the Chief Executive Officer of the Patriots.

## 1991

- Jan. 7 Dick MacPherson is named head coach of the Patriots, replacing Rod Rust (who was relieved of his duties on Jan. 4). MacPherson, Syracuse University's head coach for the past 10 seasons, becomes the team's eleventh head coach.
- May 3 The installation of a natural grass playing surface at Foxboro Stadium is completed.
- July 27 Former Patriots offensive guard John Hannah is inducted into the NFL Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio.

## 1992

- May 11 James B. Orthwein purchases the controlling interest of the Patriots from Victor K. Kiam. Orthwein becomes Chairman of the Board of the club while Francis W. Murray, the club's minority owner, becomes President. Sam Jankovich remains the Chief Executive Officer.
- May 21 Patriots begin two-year deal with WLVI-TV (Channel 56) that gives the station the right to televise the team's preseason games as well as a weekly in-season Patriots magazine show.

## 1993

- Jan 9 Sam Jankovich, the Patriots' Chief Executive Officer for the past two seasons, resigns
- Jan 21 Bill Parcells is named head coach of the Patriots, replacing Dick MacPherson (who was relieved of his duties on Jan. 8). Parcells, a two-time Super Bowl winner with the New York Giants, becomes the team's twelfth head coach. In addition, Patrick Forte is named Executive Vice President, Football Operations and James Hausmann is named Executive Vice President, Business Operations.
- Feb 25 Patriots designate linebacker Vincent Brown as the club's first transitional player under the new Collective Bargaining Agreement.
- Mar 31 Patriots Owner and Chairman James Orthwein unveils new logo and uniforms at a press conference at the Four Seasons Hotel in Boston. The new icon features a streamlined head of a minuteman while the primary color of the uniforms changes from red to blue.

Since 1976, the Patriots have conducted their summer training camp at Bryant College in Smithfield, Rhode Island. Situated on a beautiful 320-acre campus located 12 miles northwest of Providence, Bryant offers a bachelor of science degree in business administration at the undergraduate level, as well as graduate programs in business administration and taxation. Bryant's enrollment includes 3,000 full-time day students and 2,500 part-time students. More than 2,500 students reside on campus.

Bryant has a 130-year-old tradition of excellence in business education. The college relocated from a Providence campus in 1971. Since that time, the campus has expanded to accommodate a national and international body of students. The focal point of the campus is the award-winning Unistructure. It houses faculty and administrative offices and classrooms, a swimming pool, bank, U.S. Post Office, dining facilities and the Patriots' summer offices.

In 1981, a newly-completed Multipurpose Activities Center(MAC) was opened adjacent to the original physical education building. These structures provide the Patriots with expansive areas for their locker rooms, athletic training staff, equipment storage and the team's strength and conditioning center.

A new student union, the nationally recognized Bryant Center(pictured above), opened in November of 1986. A triangular, three-level structure, houses a variety of dining areas, several convenience stores, the campus bookstore, recreation rooms and student organization offices.

In 1987, the college opened a free-standing computer lab, the Koffler Technology Center.
