## GAME SUMMARY

**NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (12-4) VS. TENNESSEE TITANS (9-7)**  
 Saturday, Jan. 4 • Gillette Stadium (65,878) • 8:15 p.m. ET

The New England Patriots finished as the third seed in the AFC Playoff Field following a 12-4 finish in the 2019 regular season. New England has now qualified for the playoffs for the 27th time in franchise history (21 under Robert Kraft), the 17th time under head coach Bill Belichick and for the 11th consecutive season overall. The Patriots will host the Tennessee Titans in the first round of the playoffs. It will mark the fourth time the two teams have met in the postseason and the first post-season meeting since New England beat Tennessee, 35-14, in an AFC Divisional Playoff game at Gillette Stadium on Jan. 13, 2018.

## BROADCAST INFORMATION

**TELEVISION:** This week's game will be broadcast by **CBS** and can be seen locally on **WBZ-TV Channel 4**. **Jim Nantz** will handle play-by-play duties with **Tony Romo** as the color analyst. **Tracy Wolfson** will work from the sidelines. The game will be produced by **Jim Rikihoff** and directed by **Mike Arnold**.

**NATIONAL RADIO:** Saturday's game will be broadcast to a national audience on **Westwood One**. **Mike Tirico** will call the game with **Tony Boselli** providing analysis. **Laura Okmin** will report from the sidelines.

**LOCAL RADIO:** **98.5 The Sports Hub** is the flagship station for the **Patriots Radio Network**. A complete listing of the network's 38 stations can be found in this press release. Play-by-play broadcaster **Bob Socci** will call the action along with former Patriots quarterback **Scott Zolak**, who will provide color analysis. The games are produced by **Marc Cappello**.

## CONTINUED PLAYOFF ADVANCEMENT

The New England Patriots have won at least one playoff game for eight consecutive seasons, dating back to the 2011 season.

# PATRIOTS VS. TENNESSEE TITANS

## SERIES HISTORY

The New England Patriots and Tennessee Titans (formerly the Houston Oilers) will square off for the 44th time since the two charter members of the American Football League began play in 1960. The Patriots and Oilers played twice each year from 1960-1969, and have played 23 times since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970. In those 23 post-merger games, the Patriots are 15-8, including a 2-1 record in the postseason.

The Patriots and the Tennessee franchise have met three times in the postseason. In 1978, the Houston Oilers beat New England 31-14 in an AFC Divisional matchup at Schaefer Stadium in Foxborough, the Patriots first ever home playoff game. The Patriots beat Tennessee, 17-14 in a 2003 AFC Divisional Playoff game and then again 35-14 in a 2017 AFC Divisional Playoff game. Both of those games were played at Gillette Stadium.

New England leads the overall regular season and postseason series, 25-17-1. The last game between the clubs came last season when the Patriots traveled to Tennessee and lost, 34-10, on Nov. 11, 2018. The teams met this past summer in the preseason and held joint practice sessions together at the Titans practice facility prior to the Week 2 preseason game.

*3RD SELECTION*

**FOXBOROUGH, Mass.** – Three members of the New England Patriots have been selected to the 2019 NFL Pro Bowl. Cornerback Stephon Gilmore, linebacker Dont'a Hightower and special teams captain Matthew Slater have been selected to represent the New England Patriots in the 2020 NFL Pro Bowl on Sun. Jan. 26, 2020, at Camping World Stadium in Orlando, Fla.

**Gilmore** is headed to his third career Pro Bowl and second consecutive with the Patriots. The eight-year veteran has started all 16 games at cornerback this season and tied for the NFL lead with a career-high six interceptions, two of which were returned for touchdowns, and led the NFL with 20 passes defended. He has also registered 53 tackles and one fumble recovery.



**DONT'A HIGHTOWER**  
*2ND SELECTION*

**Hightower** was named to his second career Pro Bowl (2016). The eight-year veteran totaled 71 tackles, 5 1/2 sacks, four passes defended and one fumble recovery he returned for a touchdown. The three-time team captain has appeared in 102 career regular-season games with 99 starts and posted 505 tackles, 25 1/2 sacks, two forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries, one interception and 17 passes defended.



**MATTHEW SLATER**  
*8TH SELECTION*

**Slater** earned his eighth career Pro Bowl selection as a special teams player. Slater's eighth Pro Bowl nod as a special teams player surpasses Steve Tasker (1987, 90-95) for most special teams Pro Bowl honors in NFL history. The former fifth-round draft pick out of UCLA earned a roster position with the Patriots as a rookie in 2008 with his contributions on special teams. Entering the 2011 season, teammates elected him as their special teams captain. That year, he was also selected to his first Pro Bowl. Since then, he has earned special teams captain honors to start each season and been voted to the Pro Bowl at season's end every season except 2018. He has led the Patriots in special teams tackles for seven of his 12 seasons and had a team-leading 10 special teams tackles in 2019.

# ROBERT KRAFT CHAIRMAN & CEO

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In his 26 seasons of ownership, he has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.), logging the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (19), conference crowns (10) and Super Bowl championships (6) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (23) and have the fewest losing seasons (2) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. Super Bowl LIII was the 10th Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls. In Kraft's 26 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 21 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons. Kraft earned his 23rd winning season in 26 years of owning the franchise in 2019.

## WHAT TO WATCH FOR IN 2019

- Kraft entered 2019 with 33 postseason victories, third-most in NFL history for any ownership group. He sits one playoff win behind the Green Bay Packers (34) and three behind Pittsburgh's Rooney family (36) for most postseason wins by an ownership group. The Rooney Family founded the Steelers in 1933, while the Packers were founded in 1919.
- The Patriots have won six Super Bowls under Kraft's ownership, tied with the Pittsburgh Steelers for most Super Bowl championships in NFL history.

## DYNASTY VS. DYNASTY

Of all of the great teams throughout the Super Bowl era, the New England Patriots and the San Francisco 49ers have set a standard of extended excellence above all of the others. The 49ers run of success spanned two decades, while New England's streak is still in progress.

### A WINNING TRADITION

Robert Kraft won his 300th game overall as owner of the New England Patriots against Miami on Sept. 30, 2018. Kraft reached the milestone in his 25th NFL season and in his 432nd game, the fastest an owner has reached the milestone. Al Davis of Oakland accomplished the feat in 495 games (31 seasons) while Pat Bowlen of Denver reached 300 career wins in 501 games (30 seasons).

### A WINNING TRADITION

Kraft's winning percentage with the Patriots (.700) since taking over the team in 1994 is the highest among all owners/ownership groups with at least 200 wins (regular and postseason) with one team. He is one of just four owners with at least 200 wins and a winning percentage over .600.

## PLAYOFF BERTHS UNDER KRAFT

New England has qualified for the playoffs 27 times in its 60-year history. The Patriots have earned 21 of those playoff berths in the 26 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 22 division crowns overall (21 AFC East crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1998, 1994, 1985 and 1976). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.



## ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENT

The Patriots won more than half of their games for the 19th straight year in 2019. They are the first team to win more than half of their games in 19 straight seasons since free agency began in 1993.

The Patriots are also the first team to win more than half of their games in 19 straight seasons since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, more than the 49ers (16 straight from 1983-98) and the Cowboys (16 straight from 1970-85).

The Patriots have now won nine or more games in 23 of the 26 seasons Robert Kraft has owned the team.

## SUPER BOWL EXPERIENCE

The Patriots have 24 players who have appeared in at least two Super Bowls while with New England. In 2018, Tom Brady extended his NFL record by appearing in his ninth Super Bowl, while Stephen Gostkowski tied Mike Lodish for second-most Super Bowls played with six. Patrick Chung, Devin McCourty and Matthew Slater appeared in their fifth Super Bowl, joining 15 others in NFL playoff annals, including Tedy Bruschi, Matt Light and Adam Vinatieri.

Three Patriots currently on the 53-man roster appeared in their fourth Super Bowl with the Patriots in 2018: Marcus Cannon, Julian Edelman and Duron Harmon.

Brandon Bolden, Joe Cardona, Nate Ebner, Dont'a Hightower, Ted Karras, Shaq Mason, Elandon Roberts, Kyle Van Noy and James White have all played in three Super Bowls for New England. Although he spent one season with Miami in 2018, Brandon Bolden has played in three Super Bowls with New England as well.

Adam Butler, J.C. Jackson, Jonathan Jones, Ted Karras, Sony Michel, Elandon Roberts and Deatrich Wise Jr. have all played in the Super Bowl in every year they've played in the NFL. OL Joe Thuney is the only player in NFL history to start in the Super Bowl in each of his first three seasons. DL Keionta Davis and Derek Rivers have been on the Patriots roster every season since 2017, but were on injured reserve in 2017 and inactive for Super Bowl LIII. Ja'Whaun Bentley and Isaiah Wynn members of the Patriots but did not participate due to placement on injured reserve as a rookie in 2018.

Deatrich Wise Jr. played in the AFC Championship as a rookie in 2017, but missed the game in 2018 due to injury before returning to action in Super Bowl LIII. Keionta Davis has been on the Patriots roster and in the playoffs each year since entering the league, but has yet to participate in a playoff contest. Ja'Whaun Bentley and Isaiah Wynn members of the Patriots but did not participate due to placement on injured reserve as a rookie in 2018.

Justin Bethel, Nick Folk, Mohamed Sanu Sr. have played in conference championship games as members of other teams. Bethel participated in the Arizona's NFC Championship Game loss at Carolina in 2015, Folk kicked in the N.Y. Jets AFC Championship Game loss at Pittsburgh in 2010 and Sanu Sr. played in Atlanta's NFC Championship Game victory vs. Green Bay in 2016.

Marshall Newhouse was on the Green Bay Packers roster in 2010 when they advanced from the NFC Championship Game to the Super Bowl, but was on injured reserve. James Ferentz was active but did not play in the AFC Championship game with Denver in 2015.

## PLAYOFF EXPERIENCE

The Patriots have 37 players on the 53-man roster with playoff experience prior to the 2019 postseason. Four Patriots have played in 20 or more postseason contests: Tom Brady, Patrick Chung, Devin McCourty and Matthew Slater.

Brandon Bolden, Marcus Cannon, Nate Ebner, Julian Edelman, Duron Harmon and Dont'a Hightower have played in at least 15 postseason games with the Patriots.

Six Patriots have played in at least 10 postseason games in their careers: Joe Cardona, Lawrence Guy, Shaq Mason, Kyle Van Noy, Ben Watson and James White.

25 Patriots have played in at least one playoff game every season they've been in the NFL. David Andrews, Adam Butler, Joe Cardona, Duron Harmon, J.C. Jackson, Jonathan Jones, Ted Karras, Brandon King, Shaq Mason, Devin McCourty, Sony Michel, Elandon Roberts, Joe Thuney and Deatrich Wise Jr. have all participated in at least one playoff game since their rookie years. Julian Edelman has participated in the playoffs every year since beginning his career with New England in 2009, but spent the 2017 postseason on injured reserve.

Marcus Cannon, Nate Ebner, Dont'a Hightower and Derek Rivers have reached the playoffs every year since starting their careers with New England, but missed the 2017 playoffs while on injured reserve. James White has been on the Patriots roster since his rookie year in 2014 and made the postseason with the 53-man roster every year since, but was inactive for all three postseason contests in 2014. Patrick Chung has made the playoffs every year he's been in the NFL, including 2013 when he was a member of the Philadelphia Eagles. Keionta Davis has been on the Patriots roster and in the playoffs each year since entering the league, but has yet to participate in a playoff contest. Ja'Whaun Bentley and Isaiah Wynn were members of the Patriots but did not participate due to placement on injured reserve as a rookie in 2018.

There are 17 players on the Patriots roster that have yet to play in a playoff game, eight of which are rookies. Ja'Whaun Bentley, Terrence Brooks, Shilique Calhoun, Corey Cunningham, Ryan Izzo, Cody Kessler, Matt LaCosse and Isaiah Wynn are Patriots who have played more than one season in the NFL and have not participated in a postseason contest.

# PATRIOTS WHAT TO WATCH FOR IN 2019

## TEAM - WHAT TO WATCH FOR

- The Patriots set an NFL record by reaching eight consecutive conference title games (2011-18).
- The Patriots entered the 2019 season tied with San Francisco with 15 conference championship game appearances, one behind the 16 by Pittsburgh.
- New England entered the 2019 season with 37 postseason victories, the most in NFL history. Pittsburgh is second with 36 playoff wins all-time.
- The Patriots set an NFL record for most consecutive seasons with at least one playoff win with eight straight (2011-18 – 16 total playoff wins). In 2019, the team will look to extend that streak to nine.
- The Patriots have won 16 postseason games this decade (2010-present), the most postseason wins in a decade in NFL history.
- The Patriots enter the 2019 season with nine straight home playoff wins, third in NFL history to the 13 by Green Bay (1939-2001) and the 11 by New England (1996-08).
- The Patriots have played in 57 postseason games and need to play in three more postseason games in 2019 to become the third NFL team to play in 60 postseason games, joining Dallas (63) and Pittsburgh (61).
- The Patriots have 141 wins in this decade (regular season and playoffs combined), the most wins in a decade in NFL history, and look to add to that number.

## 2019 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- The Patriots extended their NFL record with 11 straight division titles (2009-19).
- The Patriots have now qualified for the playoffs for 11 straight seasons (2009-19), the most in NFL history. Dallas and Indianapolis are tied for second with nine consecutive seasons with a playoff berth.
- The Patriots won 12 games in 2019 and with 13 12-win seasons are second to the 14 12-win seasons by San Francisco since the 1970 merger.
- The Patriots extended their NFL record to 10 consecutive seasons with at least 11 wins in 2019 (2010-19). Indianapolis is second with seven (2003-09).
- The Patriots finished the 2019 season with 420 points and have reached 400 or more points in 13 straight seasons (2007-19), extending their NFL record. The San Diego Chargers previously held the record by scoring at least 400 points in eight straight seasons from 2004-11. The New Orleans Saints have the second-longest active streak after scoring 400 points for the ninth straight season in 2019.

## 2019 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- The Patriots (125) won their 116th regular-season game this decade (2010-present) vs. N.Y. Jets on Sept. 22, 2019, moving out of a tie with Indianapolis (2000-09) for the most regular-season wins in a decade.
- The Patriots have achieved 19 straight seasons with a record of .500 or better, second all-time behind the 21 seasons by Dallas (1965-85) after improving to 8-0 with the win vs. Cleveland on Oct. 27, 2019.
- With their ninth win of the season, the Patriots secured their 34th winning season in 2019 to move out of a tie with Dallas into second all-time behind the 36 winning seasons by Pittsburgh.
- The Patriots have posted a winning record for 19 straight seasons (2001-19), the most since the 1970 merger and the second-most all-time, behind Dallas with 20 straight winning seasons (1966-85).
- The Patriots have won at least 10 games for 17 consecutive seasons (2003-19), moving past San Francisco (16 - 1983-98) for the most consecutive seasons with at least 10 victories.
- LB Kyle Van Noy was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week following a Week 4 win at Buffalo. Van Noy led the team with eight tackles, two sacks, three quarterback hits and two forced fumbles. Late in the game with the Patriots holding a 16-10 lead and the Buffalo offense at the New England 39-yard line, Van Noy hit Buffalo QB Matt Barkley, forcing a pass that was intercepted by LB Jamie Collins to secure the victory.
- DB Devin McCourty was named AFC Defensive Player of the Month for September after he intercepted a pass in each of the first four games of the season, tying a team record for most consecutive games with an interception. McCourty became the first player in the NFL to record an interception in each of his team's first four games of the season since Minnesota's Brian Russell in 2003 and the first Patriots player ever to achieve the feat.
- CB Stephon Gilmore was named AFC Defensive Player of the Month for October for his performance in helping lead the team to a 4-0 record. Gilmore had 11 tackles, seven passes defended and two interceptions as part of a defense that held its opponents to just three touchdowns for the entire month. He had a career-high five passes defended and one interception in the 35-14 win over the New York Giants on Oct. 10.
- P Jake Bailey has earned two AFC Special Teams Player of the Week Awards after a Week 3 win over the Jets and a Week 11 win at Philadelphia. Bailey is the first rookie to be awarded two Special Teams Player of the Week honors in the same season since Kansas City Chiefs K Harrison Butker in 2017. Bailey and San Francisco DE Nick Bosa are the only NFL rookies with multiple Player of the Week honors in 2019.
- WR Matthew Slater was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week following a Week 12 win over the Cowboys. Slater blocked a Dallas punt in the first quarter that was recovered by DB Nate Ebner at the Cowboys 12-yard line. It was Slater's first career blocked punt and it led to the game's only touchdown two plays later. It was the first Player of the Week Award for Slater in a career spanning 12 seasons and seven Pro Bowl selections as a special teamer.

### 400-POINT SEASONS

The Patriots extended their NFL record to 13 straight seasons with at least 400 total points (2007-19) after finishing seventh in the NFL in 2019 with 420 total points. The Chargers previously held the record by scoring at least 400 points in eight consecutive seasons from 2004-11. New Orleans has a current streak of nine straight seasons with 400 points.

### RUSH TO VICTORY

Since 2000, New England is 51-1 in the regular season when a Patriot eclipses 100 yards rushing. The only loss during the Bill Belichick era came at Miami on Dec. 20, 2004, when Corey Dillon rushed for 121 yards on 26 carries and the Patriots fell 29-28 to the Dolphins. Since then, New England is 38-0 with a 100-yard rusher. In 2018, RB Sony Michel had four 100-yard games and New England went 4-0 in those contests.

## DEFENSE/SPECIAL TEAMS

### STACKING A DOMINANT DEFENSIVE SEASON

- The 2019 Patriots finished with the top-ranked defense in the NFL for the first time in team history. While the Patriots finished in the top-10 in defense 15 other times, they have never finished first in the NFL until 2019. The highest the Patriots had ranked prior to this year was in 1979, when they finished with the third-ranked defense. The highest the Patriots ranked under Bill Belichick prior to this year was the 2007 team that finished fourth in total defense.
- The Patriots finished the 2019 season by allowing an average of 14.1 points per game. The Patriots finished first in that category two other times in team history, allowing an NFL-low of 15.6 points per game in 2016 and 14.9 points per game in 2003.
- The Patriots allowed an NFL-low of 225 points in 2019, the fewest points allowed in a 16-game schedule by the Patriots. The previous low for the Patriots in a 16-game season was 237 in 2006. The 1977 Patriots allowed 217 points in a 14-game season. Of the Patriots 225 points allowed this season, 35 points were scored on opponent turnovers returned for touchdowns (two interceptions and three fumbles returned for touchdowns). The fewest points by a Bill Belichick coached defense was the 1994 Cleveland Browns, who allowed just 204 points (12.8 points per game). The 225 points allowed by the Patriots are the fewest by an NFL defense this decade. The previous low was by the 2011 Pittsburgh Steelers with 227 points allowed.
- The 2019 Patriots finished first in the NFL with 25 interceptions and tied for sixth with 47 sacks.
- New England led the NFL with a +21 turnover margin.

### LEAGUE-LEADING DEFENSE

The 2019 Patriots defense has allowed a league-low of 20 total touchdowns (seven rushing touchdowns, 13 passing touchdowns). Since the NFL went to a 16-game schedule, 20 defenses have let up 20 or fewer touchdowns in a full season.

The Patriots defense did not allow a touchdown in the first three games of the season, becoming the first team to not allow a passing or rushing touchdown in each of their first three games of a season in the Super Bowl era.

## ZERO FIRST-HALF POINTS IN FIVE STRAIGHT GAMES

The Patriots did not allow a first-half point in five straight games, between the 2018 AFC Championship Game and Week 3 of the 2019 season, the first team to achieve that feat in the Super Bowl era. New England's previous best was a three-game stretch with no first-half points allowed in 1977.

Nate Ebner blocked a punt vs. Kansas City (12/8), setting a new team record with a fourth blocked punt on the season for the Patriots. The 1986 Patriots blocked three punts. The Patriots returned their first two blocked punts this season for touchdowns. In the win at Buffalo on Sept. 29, Matthew Slater returned a blocked punt by J.C. Jackson 11 yards for a touchdown. Rookie DL Chase Winovich returned a first-quarter blocked punt by RB Brandon Bolden 6 yards for a touchdown vs. NY Giants on Oct. 10. In the win vs. Dallas on Nov. 24, Slater blocked a first quarter punt that was recovered by Ebner at the Dallas 12-yard line to help set up the Patriots first touchdown. Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win six Super Bowl titles. He won more regular-season games (123) and more games overall (136) during a 10-year stretch (2002-11) than any other coach in NFL history. In 2007, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in NFL history and the first since the NFL established a 16-game schedule in 1978. His 45 consecutive years as an NFL coach are tied for first in NFL history with the 45 by Dick LeBeau. The only other NFL coach with at least 40 consecutive NFL coaching seasons is Tom Moore with 41.

## WHAT TO WATCH FOR IN 2019

- Bill Belichick has an NFL-best six Super Bowl championships as a head coach and joined George Halas and Curly Lambeau as the only NFL coaches with six championships since the league began postseason play in 1933.
- Belichick seeks back-to-back championships for a second time in his career (2003-04) – a feat so rare it has been achieved by only two other coaches in history. Chuck Noll did it with the Pittsburgh Steelers in the 1970s (1974-75, 1978-79), and Vince Lombardi did it with the Green Bay Packers in the 1960s (1961-62, 1966-67).
- Belichick is third all-time with 273 career regular-season wins, behind Don Shula (328) and George Halas (318).
- Belichick has led New England to three straight Super Bowl berths, tied with Don Shula (1971-73) for the second most in NFL history. Marv Levy led Buffalo to four straight Super Bowl appearances (1990-93). Since postseason play began in 1933, George Halas led Chicago to four straight championship berths (1940-43) and Paul Brown led Cleveland to six straight championship appearances (1950-55).

## 2019 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Belichick became the third coach in NFL history to win 300 games following the win over Cleveland on Oct 27. He is the fastest to reach 300 victories, doing so in his 434th NFL game, faster than Don Shula (445 games) and George Halas (455 games).

Belichick's 17 division titles are the most in NFL history. Don Shula and Tom Landry are second with 13 division crowns.

- Belichick extended his NFL record with an 11th consecutive division title. Four other coaches are tied for second with six straight division titles.
- Belichick holds the NFL record with 13 12-win seasons. Don Shula is second with eight.

## DIVISION TITLES RECORD

Belichick again guided the Patriots to the AFC East title in 2019. His 17 division titles are the most by a head coach in NFL history. Don Shula and Tom Landry are second with 13 titles.

Teams leading by 25 had recorded 2,647 wins, seven losses and two ties, a winning percentage of .997.

## PATRIOTS RENAISSANCE

Once head coach Bill Belichick implemented his coaching design on the Patriots, his approach has given him the best record of any NFL head coach who has coached over 40 games since 2001 (including the postseason).

# TOM BRADY NEWS & NOTES

## CAREER NOTES

Tom Brady has quarterbacked the Patriots to victories in 219 of his 283 career regular-season starts, compiling a .774 winning percentage and giving him the best record of any quarterback in the Super Bowl era (since 1966). Brady's 155 career wins in his first 200 starts were the most in NFL history. Peyton Manning is second with 136 wins in his first 200 career starts.



## 2019 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Tom Brady (4,057) reached 4,000 passing yards in 2019 for the 11th time in his career, tied with Philip Rivers for third all-time, behind Peyton Manning (14) and Drew Brees (12).
- Brady has 249 career victories (regular season and playoffs combined), the most wins all-time by an NFL player.
- Brady is tied with eight other NFL players with two games with six or more touchdowns and needs one more game with six or more touchdowns to tie Peyton Manning, who had three games with six or more touchdowns.
- Brady owns the NFL record with 30 Player of the Week awards and 10 Player of the Month honors.
- Brady has the NFL record with 58 career games with three touchdown passes and no interceptions.
- Brady has played in 285 NFL regular-season games, third all-time among NFL quarterbacks, behind George Blanda (340) and Brett Favre (302).
- Brady has started every game in 16 seasons after starting in all 16 games in 2019 and is now tied with Peyton Manning for second-place, behind the 17 seasons by Brett Favre.
- Brady is playing his 20th season with the Patriots in 2019, joining Darrell Green (20 - Washington), Jackie Slater (20 - L.A. Rams) and Jason Hanson (21 - Detroit) as the only players with at least 20 NFL seasons played with one team.
- At age 42, Brady became the oldest quarterback to start on Kickoff Weekend. Warren Moon had held the record after starting opening day for Seattle in 1998 at age 41.
- Brady reached 12 regular-season wins in 2019 for the 13th time, most in NFL history for a quarterback. Peyton Manning is second with 11 12-win seasons.
- Brady (24 in 2019) set the record for most touchdown passes in a single season past his 42nd birthday. George Blanda had six in 1970.
- Brady has 74,571 career passing yards and moved past Brett Favre at Washington (10/6) and Peyton Manning vs. N.Y. Giants (10/10) into second place all-time for passing yards, behind Drew Brees (77,416).
- Brady now has 92 career 300-yard passing games, the third NFL quarterback to throw 90 career 300-yard games, joining Drew Brees (120) and Peyton Manning (93).


### BOLDEN BLOCKS THIRD CAREER PUNT

## FROM STANDOUT QB TO WR

Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo (Calif.) before transferring to Kent State, where as a senior, he completed 56 percent of his passes (153-of-275 for 1,820 yards) with 13 touchdowns. He was also the team's leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003.

Said head coach Bill Belichick on the versatility of Edelman: "He played the quarterback position in college at Kent State and all the positions really that he's played in the NFL – covering kicks, returning kicks, slot receiver, outside receiver, slot defender – he didn't do any of those things in college. I think that really speaks to his versatility and how much he's grown as a player and how many things he's learned how to do that he really didn't have much experience with in college. I'd say that's pretty unusual, especially to be as competent in them as he is."

## FATHERLY ADVICE

If there is one thing Julian Edelman has never lacked, it's athletic ability. A dual-threat quarterback at Kent State and former baseball standout in high school, Edelman once wowed Toronto Blue Jays players with his impressive footwork while fielding ground balls in an appearance at batting practice in 2011.

This natural ability may have been overlooked by NFL scouts, who let him fall to the Patriots in the seventh round of the 2009 NFL Draft. Edelman remains focused on the lessons his father, Frank Edelman, taught him at a young age. "I'm still constantly trying to learn," Edelman told the *Boston Herald*. "My dad always put it in my head, when you're green, you're growing, when you're ripe, you're lost. When you're done learning, you're done."

### SCHOOL'S NOT OUT

Although he already owns a bachelor's degree in communications and a master's degree in recreation, sport and tourism from his time at the University of Illinois, Ted Karras hasn't completely given up his notebook for an NFL playbook. Along with teammate Joe Thuney, Karras is pursuing his MBA from Indiana University thanks to an NFLPA program that provides tuition assistance for players while navigating a busy NFL schedule.

"It just seems to be that everyone keeps wanting to pay for my school, so I'm not going to turn it down," Karras told the *Boston Globe*.

Karras and Thuney began their MBA pursuit two weeks after the Patriots Super Bowl LI victory by taking online classes and Skyping with professors from Indiana University's Kelley School of Business up until training camp. They continued their classes in the 2018 offseason.

## OL SHAQ MASON

### A FAMOUS NAMESAKE

A noted sports fan and basketball enthusiast, Shaq's mother, Alicia McGuire, named him Shaquille Olajuwon Mason in 1993 after her two favorite NBA stars at the time, Shaquille O'Neal and Hakeem Olajuwon. The Tennessee native had the opportunity to meet one of his namesakes at a Memphis Grizzlies game while O'Neal was a member of the Miami Heat, receiving a special meet-and-greet and having his jersey signed.

## RB SONY MICHEL

- With 931 yards rushing as a rookie last year and 912 this season, Michel joined Curtis Martin (1995-96) as the only players in team history to post 900-plus yards rushing in each of their first two NFL seasons.



## ELECTED TEAM LEADER

Patriots wide receiver Matthew Slater was named to eight Pro Bowls (2011-17, 19) for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the ninth straight season in 2019.

The special teams ace shared what it means to be a captain with high school football players in a story published by *The Boston Globe*. "I think first and foremost, you have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice – putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

## SLATER'S EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there — fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

## SLATER SCORES FIRST CAREER TOUCHDOWN

On Nov. 10, 2007, in the third quarter of UCLA's 24-20 loss to Arizona State, Matthew Slater returned a kickoff 89 yards for the final touchdown of his collegiate career. In the Patriots 16-10 win over Buffalo on Sept. 29, 2019, DB J.C. Jackson blocked a punt, which Slater returned 11 yards for his first NFL touchdown, nearly 12 years after his last touchdown.

## OL JOE THUNEY

### SUPER BOWL RECORD SETTER

OL Joe Thuney became the first player in NFL history to start in the Super Bowl in each of his first three seasons in the NFL.

### BACK TO SCHOOL

Along with teammate Ted Karras, Joe Thuney has taken advantage of an NFLPA program that assists its players in earning college degrees. ## DL ADAM BUTLER

### 2019 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Adam Butler has set a new single-season career-high in 2019 with 6.0 sacks. The third-year defensive lineman's previous best was three sacks in 2018.

### CAREER-DEFINING CONTEST

Adam Butler arrived at Vanderbilt as an accomplished high school offensive lineman and spent his freshman season redshirting as a backup at center and guard. During his first offseason, Butler entered a rib eating contest, which judges ruled his team had lost. Butler disagreed and began arguing with the judges. Then Commodore defensive coordinator Bob Shoop was in attendance and witnessed Butler's demeanor and was impressed with his competitive attitude. Shoop convinced then head coach James Franklin to ask Butler to transition to defense.

"Coach Franklin brought me into his office and he asked me what I wanted, and I wanted whatever was best for the team," Butler told The Tennessean. "Because we were so short on defensive linemen at that time, that's how it happened."

## LB JAMIE COLLINS SR.

### 2019 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Jamie Collins Sr. has set a new career single-season mark with seven sacks in 2019. Now playing in his seventh season, his previous career high was 5½ sacks in 2015 with New England.
- Collins Sr. had three interceptions in 2019, a single-season career high. He had recorded two interceptions twice in his career (2014 and 2016).

### COLLINS FEASTING ON OPPOSING OFFENSES

Collins Sr. is the only player in the NFL with six or more sacks and three or more interceptions this season. No other player in Patriots history has reached those marks in the same season.

### PATH TO THE NFL

The road to the NFL was anything but easy for linebacker and 2013 second-round draft pick Jamie Collins Sr. The youngest of five siblings growing up in Quentin, Miss., Collins Sr. lost both of his parents when he was six years old and was raised by one of his sisters. Collins Sr. turned to football as an outlet to help him through the tough times.

"It means a lot. It's my living," Collins Sr. told the *Boston Herald*. "It kept me on track." Collins Sr.'s resiliency in dealing with adversity has made a lasting impact on fellow Mississippi native and former Patriots teammate Stevan Ridley, who grew up 30 miles west of Meadville in Natchez, Miss., and got to know Collins through a family friend.

"What I've known about him, he really has been a strong person," Ridley told the *Herald*. "Anybody that's gone through the things that he's gone through and still finds a way to be successful on the football field, you have to be mentally tough. That's what he's kind of done as a teammate here. He's come in here and accepted his role and done a pretty good job as a rookie."

As a first round draft pick, Dont'a Hightower is used to high expectations. Hightower went to training camp with jersey #45 but was switched to jersey #54 prior to the start of his rookie year in 2012. Former LB Tedy Bruschi wore #54 for 13 seasons.

Hightower understands the importance of the number and hopes to live up to its legacy. "I definitely feel honored to be able to wear this number," Hightower said. "I've read that Tedy didn't want it to be retired and

he hoped another linebacker would come in and be able to wear this number and be able to play as well. I feel honored. Tedy was a great player, and he means a lot to this organization. I'm definitely proud to be able to wear this number."

### HIGHTOWER'S SECOND SCORE

Hightower returned a fumble recovery 26 yards for a touchdown vs. Cleveland (10/27), his 94th regular-season game as a Patriot (109th including playoffs), the second touchdown of his career. His first touchdown was scored in his first NFL game on Sept. 9, 2012 at Tennessee.

### WINNER ON MULTIPLE LEVELS

Dont'a Hightower (three Super Bowl championships and two national titles at Alabama) and Russell Maryland (two national championships at Miami and three Super Bowl Championships with Dallas) are the only two players in NFL history with at least two national championships and two Super Bowl wins.

## DB DEVIN McCOURTY

### 2019 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- The Patriots, with Devin and Jason McCourty and the Seahawks with Shaquem and Shaquil Griffin, are the two NFL teams to feature twins on their roster this season. Trey and Terrell Edmunds (brothers) are also teammates on the Steelers.
- McCourty moved past Asante Samuel for sole possession of 10th all-time on the franchise interception list and now has 26 career interceptions.
- McCourty had one interception in each of the first four games of the 2019 season, tying a team record for most consecutive games with at least one interception. Mike Haynes set the original mark with a pick in four straight games in 1976. McCourty is the first player to record an interception in each of his team's first four games of the season since Minnesota's Brian Russell in 2003. McCourty is the first Patriots player to achieve the feat.

### PICK LEADER

Devin McCourty tied for fourth in the NFL with five interceptions this season, his third career season with five-plus interceptions. That mark is tied with Marcus Peters and Earl Thomas for most seasons with 5-plus interception seasons since 2010. Additionally, McCourty's 26 regular-season interceptions since he entered the league in 2010 are tied for fifth-most in the NFL.

### McCOUR-TD

DB Devin McCourty's 84-yard interception return for a touchdown in the win at Buffalo on Oct. 29, 2018 was his first career interception returned for a touchdown and the ninth-longest in team history. The pick-six was McCourty's second career score. His first touchdown came on a 104-yard kickoff return vs. the New York Jets on Oct. 21, 2012.

### DOUBLE TROUBLE

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, CB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, joined the Patriots last year. The two became the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. In the season opener, Devin and Jason became the first set of twins to play together on the same NFL team since 1926 when Gene and Tom Golsen suited up together for the Louisville Colonels. Shaquill and Shaquem Griffin of the Seattle Seahawks also accomplished this unique occurrence on Kickoff Weekend. New England also had twins on the team in 2017, with TE Jacob Hollister on the roster and WR Cody Hollister on the practice squad.

Devin and Jason were cornerbacks in the Rutgers secondary from 2005-08. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and was a year behind his brother in eligibility. Devin became the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Jason, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox.

### McCOURTY GOES LONG

McCourty had a 104-yard kickoff return for a touchdown vs. N.Y. Jets (10/21/12), the second longest kickoff return in team history. Ellis Hobbs has the longest in team history with a 108-yard return for a touchdown at N.Y. Jets on Sept. 9, 2007. McCourty was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week for his performance.

### IN GOOD COMPANY

Devin McCourty earned Associated Press All-Pro Second Team honors at safety in 2013 and 2016. He also earned Second Team All-Pro Honors as a rookie in 2010 when he played cornerback. McCourty joined Pro Football Hall of Famers Rod Woodson and Ronnie Lott as the only NFL players to earn All-Pro honors at both safety and cornerback.

### BROTHERS IN ARMS

Devin and Jason McCourty have seen first-hand the effects of sickle cell disease. Both their aunt and uncle lived with the disease while their father carried the trait. Devin and Jason partnered with Embrace Kids Foundation to form their own "Tackle Sickle Cell" campaign aiming to educate the public, increase blood donations and raise money and awareness for the fight against sickle cell disease. Devin's work with the local Boston Children's Hospital has helped advance research of the disease with doctors now as close as they've ever been to a cure.

## LB ELANDON ROBERTS

### FIRST RECEPTION SCORE

LB Elandon Roberts' first career reception resulted in a 38-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady. He is the second defensive player to catch a touchdown reception from Brady. LB Mike Vrabel caught 10 touchdown passes from Brady, including two in the postseason. Roberts is the sixth Patriots player to catch a touchdown pass on his first career reception since 2000. Roberts is the first Patriots defensive player to catch a touchdown pass from Brady since Oct. 28, 2007, vs. Washington when Brady completed a 2-yard touchdown pass to Vrabel. The only other Patriots defensive player to catch a touchdown pass was LB/DE John Tanner, who caught a 2-yard touchdown pass from QB Jim Plunkett on Nov. 24, 1974 at Baltimore. His 38-yard touchdown reception is the longest by a defensive player since DB Dane Cruikshank of Tennessee caught a 66-yard touchdown pass on a fake punt play vs. Houston on Sept. 16, 2018. It is the longest pass reception from a linebacker since the 1970 merger and the longest since Detroit LB Ed O'Neil caught a 32-yard touchdown pass vs. Atlanta on Sept. 19, 1976.

- Rob Gronkowski caught a 2-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady with 1:57 left in the first half to make the score 24-7 and cap off a 10-play, 80-yard drive.
- After the Patriots defense forced a three-and-out, a 42-yard Julian Edelman punt return gave New England possession at the Chicago 9-yard line, and Brady found Brandon LaFell for a 9-yard touchdown on the next play to give the Patriots a 31-7 lead with 1:07 left in the first half.
- On the Bears first play following the LaFell touchdown, Zach Moore forced a Jay Cutler fumble that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich and returned for a 15-yard touchdown that gave the Patriots a 38-7 Patriots lead with 55 seconds left in the first half.

## A COMEBACK FOR THE AGES

The Patriots came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular-season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (09/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (01/01/12).

## A DECADE OF DOMINANCE (2000-09)

When Robert Kraft purchased the New England Patriots in 1994, few would have thought that just 18 years later the franchise would be the undisputed team of the decade in the first decade of the new millennium. Kraft brought a winning vision to the organization and dedicated his resources to building a consistent winner. On Jan. 27, 2000, Kraft hired Bill Belichick to coach the team, and three months later the team drafted then-unheralded quarterback Tom Brady, putting the final pieces in place for the Patriots to become the most successful NFL team of the 2000s. ## A DECADE OF DOMINANCE (2010-19)

The New England Patriots have earned more wins (141) in the past decade (2010-2019) than any other team in the NFL has over any 10-year span with 115 regular-season victories and 16 playoffs wins. They also own the highest winning percentage (.700) of any team in professional sports since 1994. The Patriots also won a league-leading three Super Bowls in the 2010s, increasing their total to six and tying them with the Pittsburgh Steelers for most all-time. The Patriots won more conference championships (5), appeared in more conference championship games (8) and won more division titles (9) than any other NFL team. This landmark decade comes on the heels of another dominant decade, as the Patriots also led the NFL in Super Bowl victories, conference championships, conference championship game appearances and division titles in the 2000s.
